

TO INSTAL TWELVE MORE STREET LIGHTS IN TOWN

Rock to be Taken Out at Foot of Fourth. Other Town Council Business

The regular session of the Town Council on Thursday evening last was taken up chiefly with routine matters, including the passing of accounts, etc. In addition the following resolutions were passed:

Moved by Councillors Brennan and Eplett, and carried, that Mr. A. L'Euey be permitted to instal gasoline tank at No. 11 Spruce street south, under supervision of town engineer, any disturbance to pavement or sidewalk to be replaced.

Moved by Councillors Longmore and Bacon, and carried, that the Clerk issue cheque to the Treasurer of the High School Board for the sum of \$6000.00 on account of purchase of Principal's residence.

Moved by Councillors Eplett and Brennan, and carried, that the Ukrainian Club be allowed to fence in property on corner Second avenue and Mountjoy street under instructions of Town Engineer and Board of Works; that fence upon request of Council be removed within thirty days' notice; that Mr. Sheridan's property not be blocked by this fence and entrance be left.

Moved by Councillor Drew and seconded by Dr. Joyal, that the report of the Fire and Light Committee regarding the installation of additional street lighting be adopted and that the Power Company be requested to instal the said lights with the least possible delay.—Carried.

The additional lights recommended by the Fire and Light Committee totalled twelve, being one each at the following corners:—First avenue and Cameron street, Way and Preston, Way and Wilcox, Columbus and Wilcox, Montgomery and Preston, Wende and Preston, Way and Ren, Way and Cameron, Wende and Wilcox, at north boundary on Hemlock street, at north boundary on Tamarack street, on north side Second avenue between Cedar and Pine streets. The report also recommended the moving of the present light on Tamarack street north of Sixth avenue farther north to sidewalk steps in front of 62 Tamarack street north.

Moved by Councillors Eplett and Brennan and carried, that contract of cement walks be awarded to Curran & Biggs, as per their tender dated July 7th, subject to the Council reserving the right to add or withdraw any street before signing the contract.

Moved by Councillors Brennan and Eplett, and carried, that the contract for rock out on Fourth avenue be awarded to Leo Mascioli as per his tender dated July 7th, 1926.

Moved by Councillor Longmore, seconded by Dr. Joyal, and carried, that the Township of Tisdale be allowed to make connections at their own expense to the northern ends of water mains on Elm, Maple, Birch and Balsam streets, said mains to extend north to 8th avenue; also that connections be permitted to southern ends of water mains on Maple, Birch, Balsam, Elm and Cedar streets, upon conditions that mains are installed and house connections made in accordance with Town of Timmins by-laws and the approval of the Town Engineer; that rates to consumers be 50 per cent. higher than rate to the corresponding dwelling in the town of Timmins and that Township of Tisdale guarantee accounts of those connecting.

A resolution was also passed providing for sewer connection for a householder employed at one of the mines for a number of years and one of the old property-holders of the town. He was not able conveniently to finance the payment necessary at once, so was given the connection on payment of \$25.00 cash and personal note for the balance, the note to be paid within date of installation of sewer.

VERDICT OF DEATH BY ACCIDENT IN PILON CASE

Coroner's Jury Finds No Blame Attached to Anyone in the Matter

Monday evening a coroner's jury investigated the death of Felix Pilon, the young man who was run over by an engine in the T.&N.O. yards at Timmins on May 3rd. Pilon had both legs cut off and died three or four days afterwards in the hospital. The inquest could not proceed previously owing to the absence from the district of one of the principal witnesses. Monday evening the evidence of several witnesses was taken and the statement given to the doctor and others by Pilon before he died. From this evidence it appears that Pilon was on the way to work on May 3rd and crossed the T.&N.O. tracks while an engine was in motion. He was run down and had both his legs severed, dying later in the hospital from the injuries received. The engineer and other trainmen did not see Pilon until after he had been run down. Evidently he failed to note the movement of the engine on account of the steam. Everything possible was promptly done for Pilon, but all attempts to save his life proved fruitless. Pilon, whose home was at Ville Marie, Que., was only 25 years of age. He was an employee of the Hollinger, and crossed the tracks here as a short cut to his work. The jury on Monday evening brought in a verdict to the effect that Pilon's death was due to injuries received when he was run over by the engine, but that no blame attached to anyone for the sad occurrence. It was shown that the trainmen had used every reasonable care in their work and that none of them were in any way to blame for the accident.

CHUCKLES COMPANY PROVE POPULAR IN DISTRICT

SANITARY ORDINANCE FOR PINE RIDGE TOWNSITE

No doubt, having in view the epidemics that occurred in the past in other mining camps, the authorities are taking no chances apparently on the new communities springing up in the Red Lake mining area. The townsite of Pine Ridge, the gateway at the head of navigation to the Red Lake, Woman Lake and Birch Lake areas, is expanding so rapidly, that Magistrate J. Earl Lawson, acting under authority from the Department of Health, has appointed a sanitary committee to promulgate and enforce sanitary regulations governing those resident here or going into the mining camps further north. Pine Ridge is the centre of activity for all the mining camps of the District of Patricia, and since the Recording Office was located there on June 10, there has been a considerable influx of prospectors.

POST OFFICE ANNOUNCES RED LAKE AERIAL MAIL

The Post Office Department advises that permission has been granted to the Patricia Airways & Exploration Limited to carry mail to Red Lake by aeroplane. This company is operating a daily aerial service between Sioux Lookout, Pine Ridge and Red Lake, also making trips to Womans Lake, Birch Lake and Bull Dog Lake in Manitoba.

The Patricia Airways & Exploration Limited have issued their own stamps and these can be obtained at all Post Offices at 25c. per stamp, or at the Company's Head Office, 506 C. P.R. Bldg., Toronto.

All mail conveyed by this service via Sioux Lookout is carried at the owner's risk.

The Patricia Airways & Exploration Limited has been operating their plane "The Lark" since last March, rendering a splendid service to all parts of Patricia.
