OIL AND DIAMONDS NOW REPORTED IN THE NORTH

The variety and extent of the mineral possibilities of the North Land are again suggested by recent reports from the district north and west of Cochrane. Prospectors coming south from the extensive area now staked out for coal say that they are sure that there is oil in the country. The prospectors point out that they discovered an oil seam on the rivers in many sections and this is one of the indications of oil nearby. They also point to other indications in the country, suggesting that the district is rich in oil. While the most of the prospectors admit that oil is a little out of their line, they are certain enough that it would be well worth while to test out the country for oil. Most of them seem to believe that oil in commercial quantities will yet be tapped north of Cochrane.

Not content with their suggested discovery of oil, some of the prospectors suggest that diamonds will be found in the North Land. The formation favours the chances of diamonds being present, the scientific gentlemen are understood to say. But up to date no one has come along with any samples. Any prospector finding any diamonds north of Cochrane can leave them at The Advance office for display.
