SPECIAL MEETING OF

Council to Pay Part of Chief of Police Board Bill, While House Under Repairs.

The special meeting of the Town Council on Thursday last was occupied chiefly with routine business. What was done is told by the following three resolutions passed:-

Moverd by S. G. Eplett, seconded by Geo. S. Drew, that Chief of Police be paid in part for his board bill while the town house was being vacated and under repairs, \$100.00.-Car-

Moved by Councillors Bacon and Drew that the metal water tank be sold to the Northern Metal Co. for \$50.00, providing the purchaser removes the tank within ninety days from date, and accepts full responsibility for any damage or injury to the public or property in connection with the work.—Carried.

Moved by Councillors Longmore and Joyal, that solicitor be instructed to draw up construction by-law for the installation of waterworks as per schedule No. 1 attached. Also, that solicitor be instructed to draw up by-law for the construction of sewers as per schedule No. 2 attached, sewer to be constructed under Local Improvement, debentures for 15 years at 51/2 per cent. to be issued in payment of above work .- Carried.

Burglars entered S. I. Bucovetsky's store down the River Road on Monday night, taking away a quantity of goods. A light in the store at an unearthly hour happened to attract attention and a call was sent in to the police station to the effect that there might be something wrong in progress. The police car made a speedy trip to the scene, the police arriving only a minute or two too late for the catching of the burglar or burglars redhanded. As it was, the robber or robbers had a very narrow escape just missing the police clutches. So hurried was the departure that a quantity of goods was deserted in a yard and laneway. The police do not think the robber or robbers got much out of the crime the getaway being unduly hurried through the arrival of the police. From the investigation made by the police at the time, it would appear that at least one robber escaped by taking refuge in one of the many shacks in the district, but it was impossible to find this particular shack, though a number of places were searched. The police are carrying on a thorough search for the guilty party or parties.
