IROQUOIS FALLS WON FROM TIMMINS THURSDAY

Papermakers Defeated Locals by the Big Score of 9 to 2

The following is the report of the district baseball game as given by this week's *Broke Hustler*:—

Those who missed the baseball game between Timmins and the Falls staged here Thursday certainly missed a game worth while, and one of the best games played here this year.

To see Ed. Nickless in this game was worth the price of admission alone. He was a regular fielding and batting fool. His phenomenal fielding alone would have made him stand

out as perhaps the most prominent player on the field. He made several sensational catches the chief one being a one hand stab of Jack Lynch's bid for a three bagger. Nick raced fully 50 yards and succeeded in spearing the sphere as mentioned above. It was a most brilliant save. In addition to this he batted four times and got four hits, two singles, a two bagger and a home run. His speed on the paths made the visitors gasp. Practically all of this was done after Nick had been hit right behind the left ear with a thrown ball to second base in the third inning when McIntyre tried to catch him stealing.

We mention Ed. Nickless as being the outstanding star amongst others. Bob Pitcher twirled masterly ball throughout, being particularly effective with men on bases and when the situation looked most dangerous. The warm weather suited him fine and his control was perfect and there was more zip to the ball. It is true the visitors got ten hits, but they were well scattered and with one exception were all singles, several being of the scratchy variety.

Joe Chircoski batted well, getting two hits in four trips to the plate and purloined a base in the second inning. Every player on the local club got at least one hit.

Timmins brought over their strongest team including Jim Scully and Ernie Tate, who have not been in the habit of playing the out of town games. Bill Pierce also included himself in the line-up, but the Falls always had control of the game getting two runs in each of the first two innings and two more in the fifth, leading six to nothing before Timmins scored. At that Timmins did not have an earned run and to further demonstrate Pitcher's effectiveness there were only two innings in which they did not have men left on the bases, there being a total of nine men stranded during the game.

The Falls got two more runs in the 7th inning and one in the 8th while Timmins secured their runs in the 6th and final stanza.

The game was well handled by Frank Stoughton and Fred Sandstrom.

The brand of ball being exhibited by the Falls club in recent games is deserving of far better support than they have been accorded. The team as a whole is hitting much better and hits mean runs and runs mean games. In addition to this the Falls have a very excellent chance to winning this year as they are just as strong if not stronger than both Timmins and South Porcupine and have the advantage of the balance of the schedule in as much as they have only four re-

maining games to play, whereas South Porcupine and Timmins have six more games to play, four of which will be between themselves and it should be a game of cut-throat for the Falls.

SPECIAL WEEK END TRIP RATES ON THE T. & N.O. RY.

At the Rate of Two and Half Cents per Mile. Tickets Good Going Saturday and Sunday, Returning Monday.

At a recent meeting of the Northern Ontario Associated Boards of Trade the question of cheap week-end rates on the T. & N. O., was taken up and discussed. Mr. Alex Dewar, President of the Associated Boards of Trade, has been in communication with Geo. W. Lee, chairman of the T. & N. O. Commission, in the matter and has received a reply stating that special reduced rates are now available for week-end trips on the T. & N. O. These rates are effective May to October inclusive. The rate for these week-end excursions are on the basis of 2½ cents per mile, the round trip mileage being taken in computing the price of a ticket. Under these excursion rates, the minimum fare charged is 50 cents for adults and 25 cents for children. The tickets are good going on Saturday and Sunday, and returning on Monday. This is a material reduction from the ordinary rates, and should be welcomed by the general public. Anyone going on a week-end trip to any part of this section of the North should get in touch with the T. & N. O. station to assure themselves as to the exact amount of the price of their tickets and to protect themselves from paying more than is necessary under the regulations.

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HOLLINGER OUTDISTANCING FAMOUS HOMESTAKE MINE.

A writer in *The Market Despatch* makes an interesting comparison between the two most famous gold mines of this continent—the Homestake and the Hollinger. For many years, the Homestake Mine in South Dakota has been regarded as the paragon of gold mines, but it would now appear that Hollinger has usurped the throne. A recent comparison between the two shows that Hollinger is now turning out at least \$10,000,000 more in gold per annum than the former mine, and may put a wider distance between them this year. During 1925, Homestake produced \$5,999,073 in gold; Hollinger \$15,786,465.
