GRAVEL AND SAND AND ECONOMY AND EFFICIENCY.

From information to hand it would appear that the Town has paid, or will pay, the odd dollar over four hundred dollars for the loads upon loads of sand and gravel—chiefly sand—taken from under a house on Third avenue that used to stand high and dry, but is no longer above the level of the street. This payment represents, however, only a small fraction of the cost to the Town. To this must be added the expense entailed by the use of Town teams and men. The total cost to the Town for that sand and gravel—chiefly sand—will be well over \$2,200.00, or close to \$2.00 a load for the sand and gravel—chiefly sand—delivered. As contractors say that \$1.00 a load for gravel delivered is a fair figure, it would appear that Economy and Efficiency must have been absent on vacation when this deal was engineered.

It is difficult to believe that the Town really needed \$2,200.00 worth of sand and gravel—chiefly sand—at this particular time and from this particular cellar. In case there was such a need that famous pair "Economy and Efficiency" (disappeared from town since the last municipal election) would surely recommend some other method than the plan adopted. Had tenders been called for a large quantity of sand and gravel—chiefly sand—the needs of the Town would surely have been supplied at much less cost. Elsewhere in this issue there is an advertisement by a real estate dealer offering, in the ordinary course of business, two acres of good gravel for only \$450.00. The gravel is chiefly gravel, and can be taken out at ordinary expense, without extra men or teams. It can be hauled at times to suit the town. Some or all can be hauled away any time. The expenditure of this \$450.00 would save the Town going permanently into the business of cellar digging.

It is all very well to say: "Oh, what's a little Economy and Efficiency and Sand and Gravel—chiefly sand—between friends?" The answer is that friendliness has been about murdered in municipal affairs in this town for the time being. The present council has shown itself so suspicious of the motives and ideas of others that it can not expect to escape the atmosphere of distrust that it has itself created. To-day the Town realizes how honestly and efficiently it was served in the past by councils and officials. Accordingly, when the good faith of the good servants of the past is wantonly impugned, it is but natural that the public should contemplate that \$2,200.00 worth of sand and gravel—chiefly sand—and wonder if there is any dirt in it.

THREE MONTHS SENTENCE FOR TAKING CAR PARTS

Man Given Term for Taking Parts From Stalled Car While Owner Was After Assistance.

Recently there have been many complaints about parts and accessories being stolen from stalled cars while their owners are looking for assistance or getting in touch with the nearest garage. This form of theft is a particularly annoying one, and one that has possibilities of serious consequences. As a result of the complaints the Provincial Police have been endeavouring to capture any or all of this mean type of thief. On Wednesday Provincial Officer Finger had a man named H. Belanger before the Magistrate on the charge of theft. He was accused of taking parts from a standing car, when the owner had to leave it by the roadside on account of a breakdown. Some of the parts were found in Belanger's possession. He was sentenced to three months in jail. Others who may be tempted to similar mean type of theft should take warning from the sentence, if they are unable otherwise to realize the aggravating meanness of this type of theft.

At the same court, five drunks paid \$10.00 and costs and one was assessed \$20.00 and costs. Three men were charged by Traffic Officer E. Moore with speeding, and were taxed \$10.00 and costs each. Another speed case was dismissed. On an assault charge a local woman was fined \$5.00 and costs and advised to try and get along better with her neighbours.

A. Jeckell and Mrs. Ida Beaudreault were remanded for a week on the manslaughter charges arising from the death of Mrs. Vainio following the automobile accident near the corner of Fourth avenue and Cedar street last May. Bail of \$2000.00 each was allowed as in previous remands.

the latter for assaulting a police officer were remanded until to-day (Thursday) when they will be proceeded with.

A liquor-selling charge against S. Ollay was remanded for a week so that analysis of the beer in question may be received. Remand till to-day was also made in the case of the McDonnell Drug Co., charged with selling liquor. Similar remand was made in the case of J. B. Robillard, on a charge of having liquor illegally.

It is not a crime to speak to a policeman, or two policemen. Sometimes, however, it causes a man inconvenience and annoyance. Mr. T. Tisdale was charged this week with obstructing the police. The police story was to the effect that the accused had interfered while they were arresting a drunk. Mr. Tisdale, however, explained that the police had the man on street longer than it seemed necessary to arrest him and get him away. The man was using particularly unpleasant language, and as there were many women and children on street within hearing, Mr. Tisdale said he crossed the street and requested the police to take the man either to the hospital or the jail. The next thing, he himself was being arrested. The magistrate dismissed the case.

TUESDAY WAS A GENERAL PAY DAY IN THE CAMP.

Tuesday was pay day for the Hollinger, the McIntyre, the Dome and the Paymaster—four of the leading mines in the district. This is the first time that the pay day of these four mines has fallen on the same day. The Hollinger pay day is every second Tuesday, while the other mines mentioned pay on the 10th and 25th of the month. Only once during the year does the 10th or the 25th fall on a Tuesday, and even this once is interfered with by the fact that every other Tuesday is missed in the list of Hollinger pay days. Tuesday, May 25th, for instance, fell on the Tuesday following the Hollinger pay day. The four pay days falling on the same day is a coincidence that will not occur this year, and may not occur again for many years.
