This year Northern Ontario is to  
have a district golf tournament. Golf

The Northern Ontario Golf Tour-  
nament will be held in September,  
the exact dates to be announced later.  
A strong working committee has been

**MR. LEO MASCIOLI AWARDED**  
**TISDALE TP. CONTRACTS.**  
Mr. Leo Mascioli, contractor, Tim-  
mins has been awarded several im-  
portant contracts for the township of  
Tisdale. These include installation  
of sewers and waterworks in South  
Porcupine, Schumacher, Bartleman  
Townsite and West Timmins Town-  
site (outside the Town of Timmins).  
Another important contract given  
Mr. Mascioli is the paving with ce-  
ment of the sides of the main street  
in Schumacher. This is at the sides  
of the macadam road, from the Mc-  
Intyre Stores to Hamilton's Livery,  
twelve feet of cement paving to be  
put at each side of the road, together  
with curbing, etc. With the cement  
at the sides connecting with the ma-  
cadam road, this strip of roadway will  
be as fine a piece of street as to be  
found anywhere in the camp, with the  
exception of the specially paved  
streets in Timmins.

required in the north."
