NEW BY-LAW MAKES THIRD AVENUE THROUGH STREET

One of the Items of Business at Last Meeting of Town Council. Other Resolutions Passed.

The chief item of business at the meeting of the town council on Thursday last was the discussion arising from the petition from nearly four hundred ratepayers asking that the services of the present town engineer be retained in the interest of the town. This matter is dealt with at some length elsewhere in this issue. There were a number of other matters before the council some of them of more than passing interest.

There was a petition submitted to council, signed by a number of ratepayers, against having a Wednesday half-holiday the year round. As the petition for a by-law to make the Wednesday early closing a year round affair had not been submitted to council as yet, the counter petition was laid on the table for the present. The clerk was authorized to refund \$60.00 paid for a house sewer connection, the sewer not being installed.

On motion of Councillors Bacon and Drew the clerk was instructed to call for tenders for the construction of sewers and waterworks as per By-laws 319 and 320.

By-laws for waterworks extensions, sewers, cement walks, etc., were formally passed in accordance with previous decisions by the council. The by-law making Third avenue a through street and the by-law forbidding the use of sirens on vehicles were also duly read a third time and passed.

Some rebates in water rates etc., were granted where the water had not been used.

Routine accounts, payrolls, etc., were passed for payment.

Instructions were given the Town Engineer authorizing the purchase of pipe, valves, etc., for work in town.

Mr. A. McDonald asked permission of council to erect a taxi office for his own use near the station. The matter was referred to the Police Committee and the Board of Works.

A letter from the Provincial Secretary's Department was considered in regard to assistance in financing the erection of a new jail and municipal building. Earlier in the year the present council had practically turned down the offer of the Department for co-operation in the erection of a new jail and municipal building. The clerk was instructed to write the Provincial Secretary's Department calling attention to the fact that the previous letter had been answered but no reply to it had been received here. The Provincial Secretary's Dept. had practically asked Timmins to say what it was ready to do in the matter as a new jail was badly needed at Timmins. The council had taken the stand that the town could not afford to go into building municipal buildings this year. Councillor Eplet had opposed even asking the Department what they were ready to do, but Councillors Longmore, Drew and Bacon had stressed the fact that the idea of the Department in the matter should be obtained, as it would cost nothing to find out and would not obligate the town.

A rebate on 1925 taxes for exemption on three children was referred to solicitors for ruling as to whether it was according to law or not.

On motion of Councillors Brennan and Eplet it was decided to make the rock cut on Fourth avenue 48 feet wide, instead of 39 feet, on east side of Elm street.

It was moved by Councillors Eplet and Brennan, that Mr. Horne be paid \$50.00 on account of damage to property from water from the street on Wilson avenue and Preston street.

All the council members were present at Thursday's meeting with the exception of Councillor Longmore who is away on his annual vacation.

DEVELOPMENT OF MINING AND POWER IN NORTH

Outstanding Review of Progress Made Given in Booklet Issued by National Railways.

One of the most complete, concise and interesting reviews of the mining and power resources of Northern Ontario and Northern Quebec is given in a handsomely illustrated booklet issued by the Canadian National Railways.

The purpose of the booklet is aptly described in a foreword by Mr. Cyril T. Young, Superintendent of Development, Canadian National Railways, Toronto street, Toronto, Ont. In this foreword, Mr. Young says:—

"This booklet contains up-to-date information in condensed form on the developments in mining and power now taking place in North Eastern Canada. It is hoped that it will stimulate interest in the progress Canada is making in developing its natural resources and in the possibilities for still further advancement. It is believed that the maps in the booklet will be of special value to those interested in these developments. The booklet will be distributed throughout Canada, the United States and Great Britain. The development of Canada's resources offers a very interesting subject for discussion at business men's clubs, and we would be glad to co-operate with the secretaries of such clubs in securing well-informed speakers for such organizations throughout the Eastern States centering around New York and Eastern Canada."

In appearance the booklet is a most attractive one, and the contents are well up to the appearance. Every mining camp and the many power resources of Northern Ontario and Quebec are dealt with. There are many illuminating maps and a wealth of pointed pictorial illustrations. The booklet is fairly crammed with facts and figures, made interesting by clever arrangement and attractive presentation.

Some idea of the scope of the booklet may be gathered from the paragraphs under the heading, "Interesting Facts to be Found Throughout This Booklet." Below are given a few samples of these paragraphs:—

"Gold at the rate of \$2,500,000 per month is now being produced in Northern Ontario. Canada ranks third, and will soon rank second in the gold production of the world."

"In Canada there is no taxation on indicated or proved ore reserves."

"Hollinger Gold Mines, were 3,000 workmen pass through the gates daily is an indication of what mining is doing for Canada. Hollinger has 65 miles of underground railway—pays \$6,400,000 dividend yearly."

"Northern Ontario's purchasing power from the production of its mines has reached the astounding figure of \$80,000,000 annually."

"McIntyre Mines are driving down a shaft 4,000 feet deep at a cost of \$2,000,000. This shaft alone is using one and a half million feet of square timber. This 5-compartment shaft is being financed out of earnings over and above twenty per cent. annual dividend of \$800,000, betterments and rest account."

"The use of water powers in Canada's industries has increased 245 per cent. in ten years. Canada is now second per capita (next to Sweden) in water power development in the world."

"Canada's per capita debt is less than any of her allies, except the United States. Canadians clip the interest coupons on 80 per cent. of Canada's bonds."

"The great pre-Cambrian Shield comprises the greater part of Central and Eastern Canada. It is in the pre-Cambrian formation that the Rand of South Africa, the Mysore Mines of India, and the mines of Australia are located."

These few paragraphs indicate the scope of the booklet when it is remembered that each section of the North Land of both Ontario and Quebec is fully dealt with as regards mining and power.

Among the illustrations, the following titles may be noted:—"Abitibi Mills and Iroquois Falls," "Hollinger Gold Mines at Timmins, Porcupine District, Ont.," "General View of the McIntyre-Porcupine Mines, Limited," "International Nickel-Copper Smelters at Copper Cliff, Sudbury District," "Wright-Hargreaves Mine at Kirkland Lake," "On the Way to the Red Lake Gold Fields," "Red Lake District," etc.

The maps include:—Northwestern Quebec Copper-Gold area, Chibougamau Lake area, Que., Sudbury Gold-Silver-Nickel area, Tashota-Kowkash Mining District, Eastern Manitoba Gold Area, Red Lake, and last, but by no means least, the C.N.R. "Power Map," showing developed and undeveloped water power resources in the North Land.

This C.N.R. booklet should certainly be of great value in making better known what the North Land possesses in mines and power.
