DEATHS IN THE NORTH FROM WOOD ALCOHOL POISONING.

Three deaths were reported recently from alcohol poisoning in the North. Two of these were in the vicinity of Sudbury and the other near North Bay. The one near North Bay is said to be an ordinary alcohol poisoning case, but the two near Sudbury are understood to be due to drinking liquor with wood alcohol as a chief feature. The Sudbury district cases are said to have been caused by some tourists leaving a bottle of liquor from which several members of a family took drinks, all being very ill as a result and a man and a woman finding the concoction a fatal drink. The police have the matter under investigation.

FALLING-OFF SHOWN IN THE RED LAKE CLAIMS RECORDED.

Last week the number of claims recorded at Pine Ridge for a seven-day period was only 27, which is less than half the smallest number recorded in the average week since the office was moved to Pine Ridge. The previous week the recordings totalled 114, and other previous recordings, going back each week for several previous weeks, were 94, 60 and 109. Of the 27 claims recorded a week ago, 19 were for claims in the Narrow Lake area, 5 at Woman Lake, and 3 at Red Lake. Last week's recordings are generally referred to as being the smallest since the establishment of the office at Pine Ridge. The falling-off in activity is due almost entirely to the fewer number of Narrow Lake claims recorded, which in turn is attributed to the fact that the bulk of the promising ground in that area had already been taken up, a total of 375 claims in that field having been staked and recorded in a period of two months.
