CONSOLIDATED WEST DOME OPERATING PROFITABLY

Actual Conditions at Mine Much Improved and Ore Reserves Increasing

While the necessary work is being done to reach the gold at depth, the Consolidated West Dome Lake is now officially stated to be operating profitably according to A. E. Moyses's Market Despatch, which is usually particularly well-informed and accurate in its references to mines and properties in the Porcupine. The Market Despatch last week says:—

"As underground development progresses in the lower horizons at Consolidated West-Dome Lake Mines, we are officially informed that ore reserves are increasing, and actual conditions very much improved. The new high-grade vein, being opened up along the 1,050-foot level, is already 75 feet long, and the last assay received at the head office of the Company, in Toronto, showed values of \$18.75 in gold over 3 1/2 feet of width. "As the drillers drive to the east along this vein, they are nearing a point directly underneath where two veins join on the surface, and those in charge of underground operations are hopeful that, at the junction along the 1,050-foot level, a discovery of major importance will be made. "The winze is now down to about 1,275 feet and, within the next two weeks, and after certain work in progress along the 1,200-foot level is completed, further sinking to the 1,350-ft depth will be under way. 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TIMMINS L.O.B.A. ENJOY VISIT TO IROQUOIS FALLS.

On Friday evening last fourteen members of the L.O.B.A., No. 677, Timmins, paid a visit by bus to the Iroquois Falls lodge of the association going over by Hamilton's Bus. The Scarlet Degree was conferred by the Timmins ladies, after which the members of the Iroquois Falls lodge served a dainty lunch.

The ladies all report an excellent time, the trip to and from the Falls being made in comfort, the road not bad and the bus making it a real pleasure to travel the motor way to the Falls.

TIMMINS BASEBALL CLUB SUSPENDED, SAYS BROKE

Gives Report of Special Meeting of Temiskaming Baseball League on Saturday.

According to an article in The Broke Hustler, of Iroquois Falls, this week Timmins baseball club has been suspended from the league until a percentage said to be due from last year is paid. The Broke also gives the decisions in the protests regarding Brydge and Nottingham. Here is the report as given by The Broke Hustler:—

At a special meeting of the Temiskaming Baseball League held in Haileybury, Saturday for the purpose of settling two protests, one by South Porcupine against the Falls for playing Bill Brydge and the other by Cobalt against Haileybury for playing Nottingham, the former was thrown out for lack of evidence due to the non-appearance of any South Porcupine delegates or any evidence in support of their protest, while the latter was upheld by the league and player Nottingham suspended.

In the Nottingham case it was proven that he had played for Timmins in the regular schedule league game before he participated in any games in the Southern section. This automatically threw out the games in the Southern League. It was claimed that Nottingham had registered with both Haileybury and the Timmins Club.

The Timmins club was also notified by the league that they now stand suspended as a club for not having paid 10% due the league from last year's play off. The Timmins club was written in May several times that if they did not pay this money they would be suspended and as no answer whatsoever has been received by the league there was no alternative.

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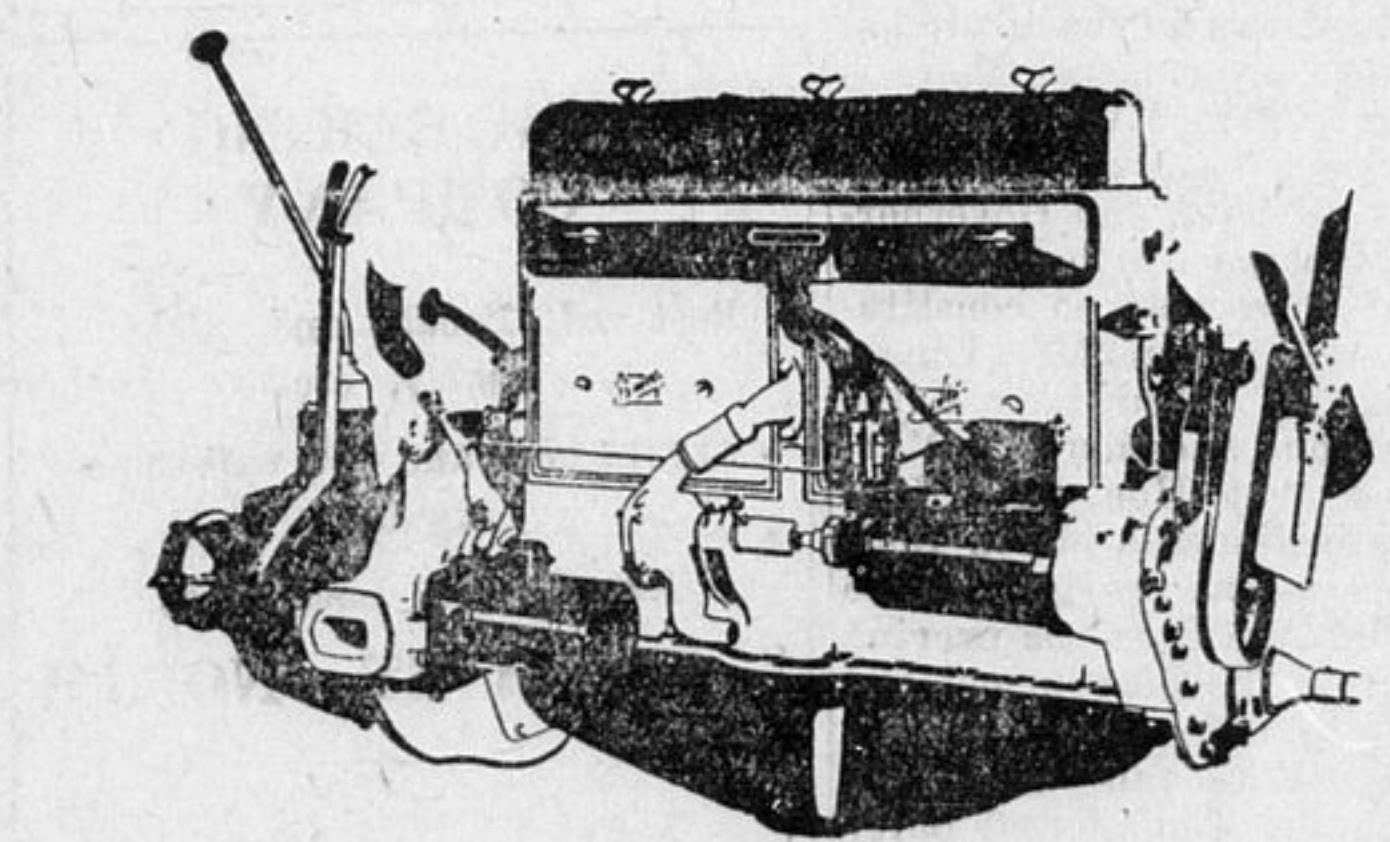
NO POTATO BUGS IN THIS PART OF THE NORTH LAND

"I never saw a potato bug in Mountjoy Township," said one of the settlers there, when asked about an item in The Haileyburian last week relative to southern Temiskaming being free from potato bugs this year. A Timmins man who has successfully grown potatoes in his garden here for many years said that he had never seen any potato bugs here, though he had been troubled enough with them at Haileybury. "There used to be lots of potato bugs at Haileybury," he said, "and if they are free from them this year down there, they sure will think they are in luck." So far as can be learned, potato bugs are remarkable in Timmins and district for their absence. Dozens spoken to about the matter agree that no matter how many or how big other bugs may be in this district, there are no potato bugs in Timmins or Mountjoy. "Never had to spray for potato bugs in Timmins or Mountjoy," said a man who has lived at different times in both the town and the township. For a country that can grow such fine crops of high-class potatoes, it is a noteworthy matter that the potatoes of this district can say, "There are no bugs on us." Of course, apart from the potatoes there are some bugs here, although this is not meant as any particular personal reflection.
