LISKEARD REPRESENTATIVE WRITES ON CRATE FEEDING.

Writing to The Advance, Mr. W. G. Nixon, Agricultural Representative at New Liskeard, says:—

Crate-fed chickens, according to the Extension Department, Ontario Agricultural College, Guelph are always in great demand. No doubt many poultrymen throughout the district have already realized this fact, especially those who have demonstrated to their own satisfaction the difference between the quality of meat in crate-fed and non-crate-fed roasters. The time will soon be here when Poultrymen will again be giving this matter some thought and attention, therefore we beg leave to offer the following suggestions re rations, care, etc. relative to crate feeding. This information is issued by the Department of Extension, O.A.C., Guelph, and should

be of interest to most poultrymen:—

- To crate fatten—
- (1) Choose cockerels of quick growing, early feathering, rapid maturing strains. These, if select, vigorous stock, will fatten readily.
- (2) Starve birds for 12 hours before beginning the fattening ration.
- (3) Feed at regular intervals, and start light, gradually increasing, taking four or five days to bring the birds to full feed. Remove surplus feed after each feeding and keep the feed trough clean.
- (4) Feed for 10 to 14 days, and be careful not to overfeed. Allow the birds 20 minutes and then take any remaining feed away. Three feeds each day give best results.
- (5) Starve 12 hours before killing. Sell direct to city customers. Do not ship alive.

- Rations for crate feeding—
- (1) Mash mixture containing 60 lbs. of ground corn, 40 lbs. flour middlings with either skim milk or buttermilk to such a consistency that it will pour readily from the pail into the trough.
- (2) Ground corn, wheat middlings, sifted ground oats, equal parts of each by weight. Mix to a thin batter with skim or buttermilk.
- (3) Ground corn, 2 parts; wheat middlings, 2 parts; sifted ground oats, 1 part; mix with skim or buttermilk, using 1 lb. of grain to 2 lbs. of milk. No. 3 is being used at the O. A. C., poultry department.

Miss Mary Elizabeth O'Callaghan, daughter of E. O'Callaghan, retired merchant of this town, passed away at the family residence, Pitt street, Monday. Miss O'Callaghan had been in ill-health for four years, the last six months seriously. She was a school teacher by profession,

having taught at St. Andrews, Eamers Corners and Cornwall and was prominent in Junior I.O.D.E. work. She is survived by her parents, three brothers, and three sisters, W. J. O'Callaghan, manager of the Royal Bank of Canada at Stettler, Alta., Edwin, of the engineering staff of the Hollinger Mines, Timmings, Ont., both of which were home during Cornwall's Old Home Week recently and John, of the Canadian Immigration Service here, and the Misses Katherine H., Margaret H., and Norah M.
