

Porcupine Agricultural Fair on Wednesday, Sept. 15th

New Fair Grounds at Porcupine Station. Big List of Entries Expected. Good Prize List Announced. Many Special Features. Sports, Athletics, Novelties, Etc.

Porcupine Agricultural Fair will be held on the new fair grounds at Porcupine Station on Wednesday, Sept. 15th. The prize list has been issued, and shows an attractive list of good prizes in all classes.—Horses, cattle, sheep, hogs, poultry and pets, dairy and other products, domestic science, fruits, field grain, roots, vegetables, painting, hand-decorated china, infants' wear, miscellaneous art, fancy work, plants and flowers, children's work, etc.

There is a striking array of special prizes in practically every department. In brief, the prize list is a very comprehensive one and will compare more than favourably with the average fall fair event.

One of the special features will be a Singing Contest, open to any school north of North Bay. Choir must have not more than 40 or less than 10 voices, and to consist of sopranos and altos. Winning school choir will have name engraved on cup and can retain possession for one year. Cup to be the property of the Porcupine Agricultural Society.

Other special features will include the baby show (15 months and under); wood sawing contest; team-driving contest; best decorated motor car; etc.

The Northern Ontario Associated Boards of Trade are offering a Cup for the best cattle entry.

There is a long list of sports and races, with cash prizes. One of these events will be a bicycle race round Porcupine Lake, with a first prize of \$5.00, a second of \$3.00, and a third of \$1.00.

There will be a number of interesting special attractions announced

later by poster and through The Advance.

The Porcupine Fair has become an institution in this district, and is recognized as one of the outstanding events of its kind. This year it is expected that the Porcupine Fair will exceed past successes in every way. There is a very convenient train service, and the hundreds from all parts of the camp who have enjoyed the day in past years will find September 15th the best yet.

WORLD'S POULTRY CONGRESS AT OTTAWA, JULY 27TH, 1927

The Governor General elect, Lord Willingdon has expressed to the President of the World's Poultry Congress, Mr. Edward Brown, his very keen interest in the Congress. On assuming office Lord Willingdon will become chief patron to the Congress, and will welcome the international delegates when they assemble at Ottawa, July 27th, 1927.

Canada's part in the World's Poultry Congress Exhibition is an important one. It will comprise a national educational exhibit depicting our national poultry policies; a national live bird exhibit; provincial exhibits, and commercial exhibits. The staging of these will be in the hands of the Canadian Exhibition Commissioner. New buildings now in course of construction on the grounds of the Central Canada Exhibition will be available for the World's Poultry Congress Exhibition at Ottawa, July 27 to August 4, 1927. This will be the largest exhibition ever staged devoted entirely to one phase of live stock, the whole requiring nearly 200,000 square feet of floor space.

REDUCED RATE ON HIGH EXPLOSIVES ON T. & N.O.

The People's Railway Voluntarily Puts into Effect the New Rates Set by the Railway Board

Last week reference was made to the order of the Dominion Board of Railway Commissioners making a reduction in the freight rates on high explosives. The order applied only to railways like the C.P.R., the C.N.R., the N.C.R.; and others under Dominion jurisdiction. It did not apply to the Temiskaming and Northern Ontario Railway which is owned by the Province of Ontario and does not come under the ordinary orders of the Railway Board. However, it is a well-known fact that the T. & N.O. almost invariably observes any orders of the Dominion Board, being especially prompt to do so when such orders give advantage to the people. Accordingly, it was expected that the T. & N.O. would put the reduced rates on high explosives into effect on this line. Mr. Geo. W. Lee, chairman of the T. & N.O. Commission, was a visitor to Timmins last week and told The Advance that the T. & N.O. would certainly follow the order of the Dominion Board in this matter. In connection with this question, Mr. Lee referred to the following letter sent by Mr. A. J. Parr to The Northern Miner:—

"Re rates high explosives, less than carload shipments.

"With reference to the above, and an item which appeared in your issue of the 21st, I may say that this is covered by General Order No. 432 of the Board of Railway Commissioners for Canada, issued Friday, the 13th, to take effect Monday, the 30th. As stated in your article, the T. & N.O. Railway is not under the jurisdiction of the Board, but, following what has been the usual practice, our chairman has authorized me to comply with this order, and I have accordingly issued Supp. 16 to T. & N.O. Local and Joint Commodity Tariff No. 177, Supp. 3 to Nipissing Central Tariff No. 18 and Supp. 4 to Nipissing Central Tariff No. 24, complying with this order.

"I might say for your information that we already had in effect on the T. & N.O. an arrangement whereby prospectors had been enjoying this same rate right along."
