Asked to pray for warm weather so that her grandmother's rheumatism would leave her, little Betty petitioned: "Oh, Lord, make it hot for Gran'ma."

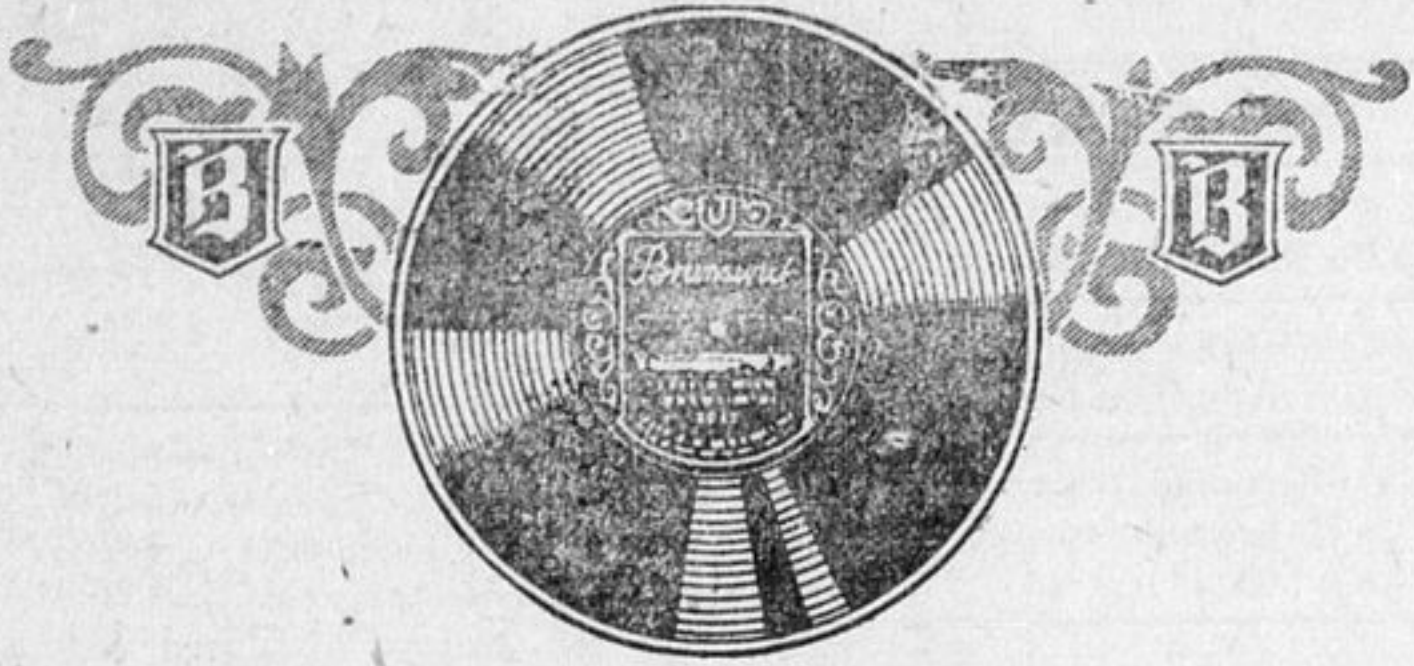
