

**ABITIBI MILL MAKES
REMARKABLE NEW RECORD**

Tuesday's Production was 564.36
Tons, Beating Previous Record
by 12 Tons

The Abitibi Power and Paper Company mill at Iroquois Falls made a new record for production on Tuesday when 564.36 tons of paper were made. The previous high record, made some months ago, was 552.48 tons for the day. In view of the fact that the normal capacity of the mill is given as 500 tons per day, the previous record was a noteworthy one, and it was generally believed that it could not be beaten. The new record is a proof of what earnest co-operation and skillful organization can accomplish, with all, from manager down to the youngest member of the staff of the plant, working to uphold the Abitibi ideal of efficiency and progress. The Abitibi plant has won a reputation for achieving a place where it has out-

distanced other plants to such an extent that it must beat its own records to show further progress. The new manager, Mr. J. E. Patterson is to be congratulated on showing that he is keeping up the usual reputation of the Abitibi as a producer.

The final wind-up of the P.D.F.L. was fought out at Timmins last night when the Holly Rees and McIntyre battled for the Boxers' Challenge Cup, the Holly Rees winning out 1 to nil.

During the match both goalies had plenty to do and were lucky on a few occasions to get the leather clear. The McIntyre lost a few chances by being weak in front of the goal and a tendency to bunch together during the second half. There was no score at the interval and little time was lost in changing over on account of darkness coming on.

The second half was not very old when N. Dougall got a pass and dribbled it down the touch line and centred to McKenzie who scored on a

neat shot. The match then became a little ragged and many appeals from players and spectators alike were made to the referee and eventually the spectators lost their heads and tried to run the match and this became very unsportsmanlike as the match wore on.

Three minutes from time N. Dougall who was lying in an offside position, got the ball and scored. Owing to the darkness and his position, the referee was unable to see clearly and awarded a goal but the McIntyre supporters raged on the field at the referee, and listening to the appeal, the referee consulted the linesmen and the goal was disallowed. At the final whistle the crowd again burst on the field to attack the referee and one of them managed to give him a blow on the head. Apart from this it was a fairly good match and the Holly Rees deserved the win.

**LARGE LIST OF CASES AT
POLICE COURT THIS WEEK**

Six drunks paid the usual ten and costs at police court yesterday, and there are a couple more to have a hearing to-day. The gambling cases were all withdrawn, owing to a twist in the town by-law under which the charges were laid. The man in whose place the gambling was charged as occurring, Steve Borenka, was fined \$25.00 and costs under the clause relating to those holding licensed premises and permitting gaming to be done.

There were a number of remands, some of the cases being remanded until to-day and some until next week.

Three assault charges were remanded; one of them being an assault case,

another being a case of assault with a bottle, and the third an assault with a knife. A charge of selling liquor is remanded to next week to permit of an analysis of the goods. Mrs. Hogan is faced with a charge of illegally having liquor.

Another remand made was on the charge against G. R. Belvaux, said to be from Cochrane, who was charged by Chief Pascoe with living on the avails of prostitution. Two women found in the rooms occupied by Belvaux were also taken in charge and are charged with being inmates of a disorderly house. This case is to be proceeded with this afternoon.
