WOMAN LAKE PROMISES TO BE BIG MINING AREA

Will Outrive the Older Sections of the North as a Gold Producer, Says a Correspondent.

Written from Pine Ridge last week a despatch says:—

"Woman Lake, the companion of Red Lake mining area, bids fair to outrive the older section as a result of the Hollinger's plan for development of the Jackson-Manion group of claims on which an option was taken some time ago. The terms of this option have not been made public in detail and for this reason, possibly, the Woman Lake rush has not yet been so spectacular as the flow of prospectors was at first into Red Lake.

"Geologist Ringsleben of the Hollinger offices at Timmins has made a thorough examination of the Jackson-Manion claims and is said to be strongly impressed with the possibilities of the district. A programme of surface exploration and diamond drilling has been recommended and A. F. Brigham, of the Hollinger, has in hand the plans for this work.

"The main break on the Jackson-Manion property has been stripped for a distance of nearly 300 feet. A gang of men are at present at work in preparation for establishing camp buildings. The vein itself is composed of well mineralized quartz carrying visible gold in places across a width varying from 8 to 23 feet. The Hollinger decided to acquire the option only after a careful examination by channel sampling had been made."

TRAVELLING SCHOOLS FOR NORTHERN CHILDREN

Ontario Government Making Another Move to Assure Education for all Children.

The Ontario Government and especially the Minister of Education, Hon. G. Howard Ferguson, the Premier, have not received the appreciation apparently deserved for the recent efforts made to assure educational facilities for all children. The Correspondence Courses inaugurated last year for the benefit of the families of settlers in sparsely-settled districts have been of the greatest possible value. These courses have provided educational facilities for many children who otherwise would have been forced to go without any schooling. About eighty youngsters in this North are benefitting from the Correspondence Courses.

Another plan adopted by the Ontario Government to make education available to all in this province is now under way.

With a view to providing educational facilities to the children of railwaymen and residents in the remote stations and settlements along the railroad lines in Northern Ontario, the Provincial Government, in co-operation with the Canadian National and the Canadian Pacific railways, has completed plans for a unique experiment in bringing the "little red schoolhouse" into the unbeat paths of the hinterland. The plan, which will be put into effect within a week or so, calls for the operation of two travelling school cars which in every way will be the equal of the rural schools both in equipment and in efficiency of instruction. Dr. McDougall, Chief Inspector, in charge of the cars, states that it was the intention of the Department of Education this year to operate only two cars, one to take care of the children on the Superior division of the Canadian Pacific between the stations west of Sudbury to Chapleau, and the other on the Capreol division of the Canadian National to run between Nandair and Palmar. These territories were selected by the Department of Education after making a thorough survey of the educational needs of the North, and should the travelling schools prove to be a success it was intimated that the plans probably would be extended to include other railway subdivisions. Both cars are much the same in construction. Approximately one half is devoted to the school room proper. A dozen desks of the usual school type, grading from those for larger pupils down to the smaller ones for the first books have been installed, while at the so-called front of the room stands the teacher's desk with a blackboard behind. Besides the ordinary school equipment, including a regulation bell to summon the scholars, there are two book cases, one containing the usual school books and the other a small lending library, including standard works for the adults, as well as juvenile reading.

DR. HERBERT SULLIVAN INJURED AT MADAWASKA

Dr. Herbert Sullivan, who was with Dr. H. H. Moore at Timmins for some time, and who a few weeks ago was visiting his brother, Mr. W. R. Sullivan at Schumacher, last week met with a serious accident while going by gas car to visit a patient at Madawaska, Ont. The car left the track while travelling at a rapid rate, and Dr. Sullivan was hurled several feet. He had the misfortune to break a bone in his shoulder and two bones in the leg, as well as sustaining bad bruises and a severe shaking up. Dr. Sullivan is now in the Toronto General Hospital where he is making good progress to recovery. His many friends in Timmins, Schumacher and district will regret the accident to Dr. Sullivan and very sincerely wish for him a very speedy and complete recovery.
