Mr. R. Craft returned on Tuesday evening from Atlin, B.C., where he has been for some months past in connection with a placer gold proposition owned by a local syndicate. Mr. Craft says that the propects are of the brightest, while it is very evident that he is in love with the "Land of the Midnight Sun."

Atlin is at Latitude 60, which is about 1500 miles further north than Timmins. The climate, however, he says, is more moderate than this part of the country, severe cold even in winter time being unusual, and the summer being particularly pleasant. Mr. Craft says that in the summer time there is practically no night. About midnight there comes a very brief time of twilight and the daylight reigns again. Tourists reaching there by boat are very perplexed by the continual daylight and until they get accustomed to the phenomenon are at a loss to know when to go to bed. "All this summer," says Mr. Craft, "the days were beautiful-not too hot,-just right,-and twentyfour hours of it. And there were no rainy days. A wonderful country and a wonderful climate."
