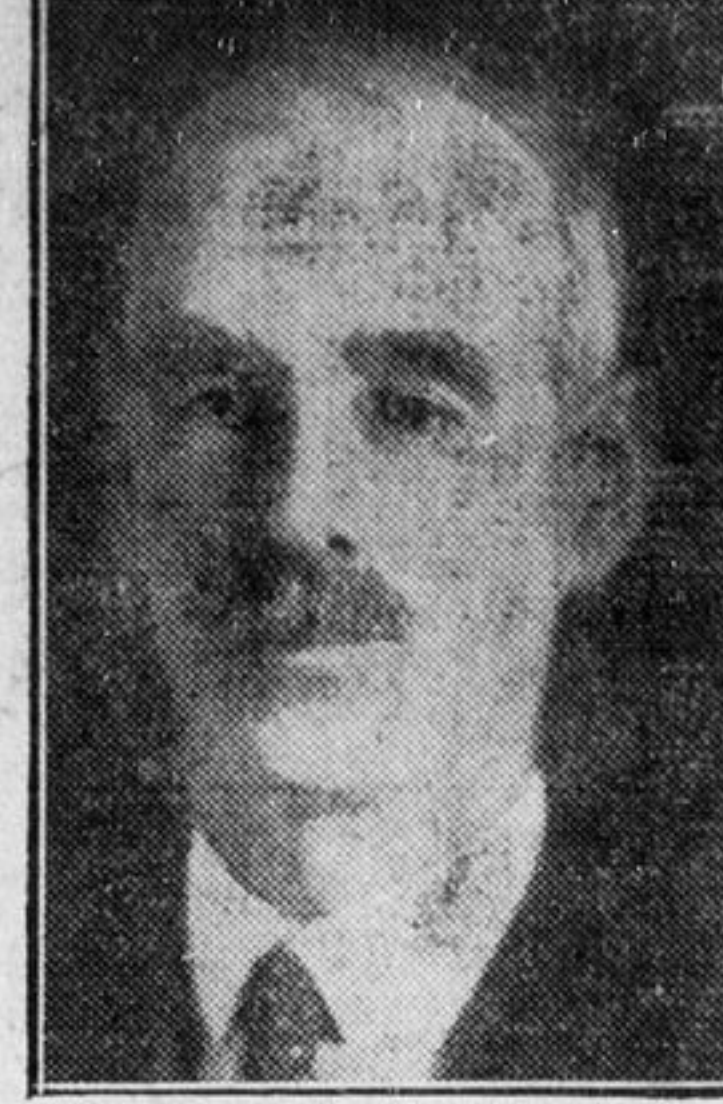
HON. J. D. CHAPLIN

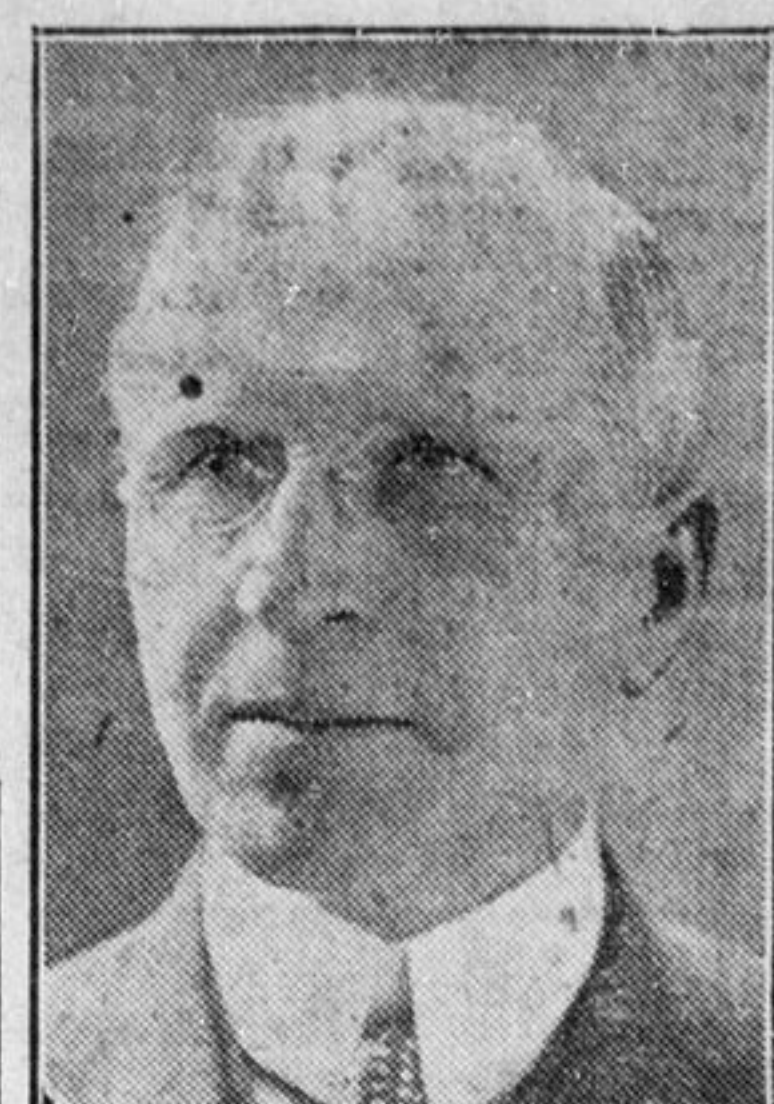
HON. RAYMOND D. MORAND M.D.

#### PRESIDENT OF BEAVER TO SEEK RE-ELECTION

Mr. F. L. Culver, president of Beaver Consolidated Mines, who stated last week that he would not be a candidate for re-election at the forthcoming annual meeting, announced on Monday of this week, according to a Toronto newspaper, that he had reconsidered his decision and would enter the ring. In a statement yesterday, Mr. Culver stated that he will advocate a policy for the distribution of Beaver's assets. Beaver has in its treasury approximately 1,200,000 shares of the common stock and 500,000 shares of the preferred stock of Kirkland Lake Gold Mining Company. There has been an agitation among some of the Beaver shareholders for the distributing of these assets and talk has been heard on the street of the formation of a shareholders' committee to try and bring this about. Present market value of Beaver's assets is about \$2,000,000.

#### HOLLINGER NOT TO BLAME FOR POLL TAX REDUCTIONS

Some annoyance has been caused to men at the Hollinger Mine through deductions from their wages for the new town poll tax. It is only fair to state that the Hollinger is in no way to blame for this deduction. The new town council some time ago passed a by-law to collect this tax. The Provincial law gives the council this authority and further the law provides that the employer must take this tax from the payroll when requested to do so. The mine has no option in the matter. The law makes it compulsory for the mine office to assume this disagreeable work.

The new poll tax has caused considerable annoyance, being deducted from property-holders as well as income tax payers. In the township of Tisdale the tax is collected from income tax payers who are acquainted with the fact that the amount is credited on their income tax to the township. In the township property-holders are not put under this tax at all. There is an opinion here that the collection from property holders is not regular. However, as noted before the mine has no option in the matter, simply being required by law to deduct the amount from the list submitted by the town. It is understood that some of those who feel that they have been improperly taxed in this way are taking legal advice in the matter and may test out the legality of the proceedings in the courts. In answer to the argument that the \$5.00 would be allowed on the regular property taxes on his residence one man said, with some show of reason: "Why should I be one of the few paying any taxes at all this year?" This seems to be another case of unnecessary annoyance and ill-will created by the council's silly desire to do something different from what was done by previous councils. The new council will find its only plain sailing is when it follows the precedents of former councils in such matters. All these things have been studied out before. The new council is not fishing up something new, but simply foisting forward something that experience has shown to work poorly.

### COUNCIL ORDERS TAXI BUILDING TO BE REMOVED

Mr. G. N. Ross Appointed Auditor Until End of Year. Other Council Business.

The regular meeting of the town council was held on Thursday evening last with the Mayor in the chair and all the councillors present. There were many interesting items of business, and at least one item that while not business was of some interest. This item was a dissertation by the Mayor in regard to The Advance. The Mayor apparently does not love The Advance, but who cares? The Mayor found fault with The Advance for urging the council to take some action in regard to the power and light franchise so that the people will not have to continue paying a higher rate than necessary for lights. The Mayor also seemed to be annoyed because The Advance will not confine its sources of information to the so-called "official" lines that please the council. The Advance has no interests to serve but those of the public, and is content so long as its information is correct. The power and light question should be dealt with by the council. The Advance will not be content with the question being used in any other way than the interests of the people.

The Council on Thursday evening formally decided by resolution to have the little building used by some of the taxi drivers as an office removed from the town property on Spruce street. The building is certainly more of eyesore than the town tank now that the park is taking shape. The council accordingly is to be commended for the following resolution: Moved by Councillor J. H. Bacon, seconded by Dr. A. P. Brennan, that the taxi stand building on Spruce street be removed.—Carried.

Another resolution dealt with the appointment of a town auditor, Mr. W. D. Cuthbertson, having been asked to complete his services. This resolution was as follows:—

Moved by Councillors Brennan and Drew and carried, that the application of Mr. G. N. Ross to audit municipal books from June 30th to December 31st, 1926, at a fee of three hundred dollars be accepted.

Moved by Councillors Brennan and Drew, and carried, that the Timmins Horticultural Society be granted the sum of one hundred dollars to carry on their work.

In addition to the above business, routine matters were dealt with, including the passing of accounts, payrolls, etc. Estimates for concrete walks and for waterworks extensions and sewers were passed for payment.
