## Youngsters Injured at South Porcupine by Bicyclist

**Five-Year-Old Girl Has Unfortunate Experience. Cyclist Did Not Stop to Aid Youngster. Other Items of Interest from South Porcupine Correspondent.**

At the political meeting in the interests of the Conservative Candidate Mr. R. O'Neill in the Majestic Theatre on Friday last the building was packed to the doors, many of all the various political leanings being anxious to hear what the Hon. H. Ferguson's introductory remarks referred to his hike from Kelso to Porcupine fifteen years ago and his amaze at the development that had taken place. He spoke of how hard it used to be to get a sympathetic or listening ear down at Queen's Park when he wished to introduce measures or schemes for the North that meant the expenditure of money. Now this was reversed

and the people of Southern Ontario, especially those in power, were becoming widely awake to the vast importance of our North Land. He considered the \$4,000,000 spent on roads and the half million for Education in the North, not an expenditure but a sound and most remunerative investment (loud applause). He said that he believed that twelve months from now a person would be able to get into his motor car in one of these northerly towns and stay right in it, till he arrived at the King Edward Hotel, Toronto. (he did not state how long said motorist might have to remain in his car, but here's good luck to the first party that essays the trip.) In spite of a certain amount of heckling the Premier of Ontario was always ready with a plausible explanation an affable answer or a witty retort. As to the results good or otherwise that will come from supporting the Conservative candidate, that matter will be settled by the time this is in print, and it behooves us all, whether pleased or not, to cease grousing and play the part of a good citizen by doing whatever we can to enable our elected representative and the elected government to get down to business and do something, if not in our way, then in their own way, for our constituency and our Dominion, for we strictly believe each loves this fair "Lady of the Snows" and want to see her prosper.

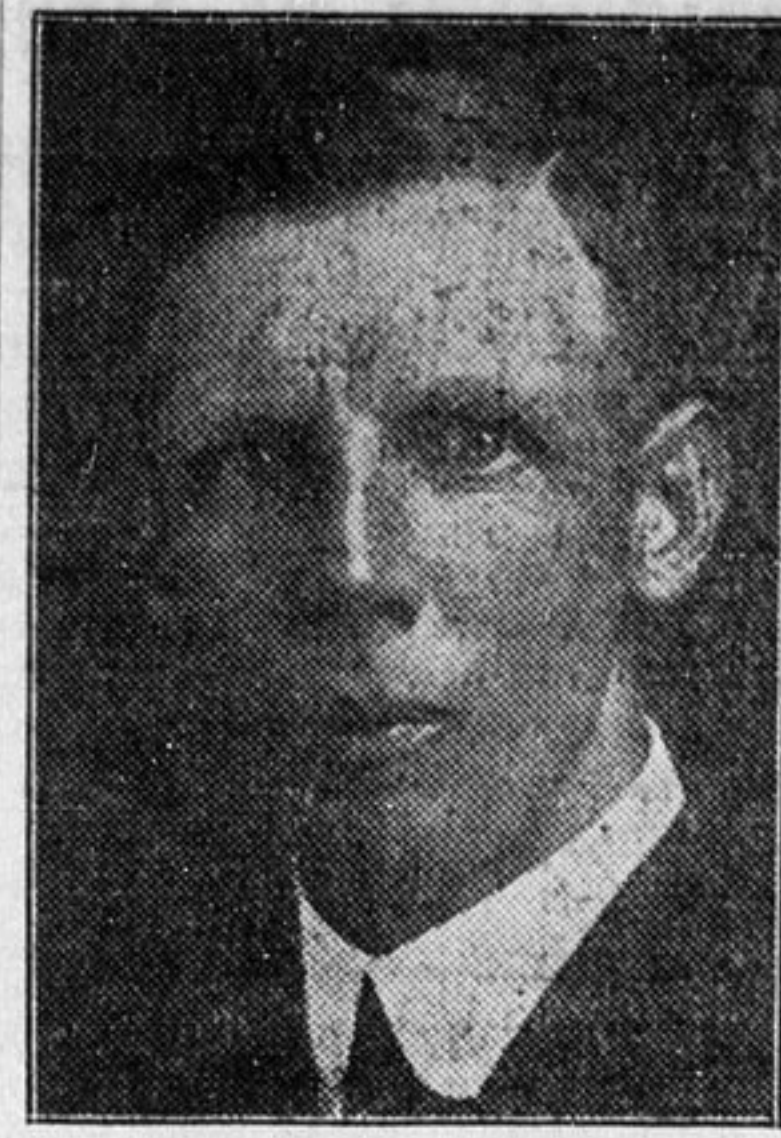
Mrs. John Hill and baby, Jean are home after a six weeks' visit in the south.
