aged to beat even this team in stretcher drill, so all-in-all the Dome did exceedingly well and deserve commendation for their success in their first attempt at Dominion competition, as well as having won the Provincial trophy two years in succession.

NEW ABITIBI-TEMISKAMING GEOLOGICAL MAP IS ISSUED.

The Quebec Bureau of Mines has just issued a geological map compiled under the direction of its officers. This map shows in colours the various geological formations of the Abitibi-Temiskaming region. It indicates the existence of an area of some 110 miles by 150 miles, in which predominate rocks similar to those in which are found the deposits of Rouyn. The map with its explanatory notes will be of considerable advantage to the prospectors and a guide in this vast area to localities indicating favourable conditions for mineral searches.
