TOWN OF TIMMINS

BY-LAW No. 318.

By-law Respecting Poll Tax

The Municipal Council of the Corporation of the Town of Timmins enacts as follows:—

1. That any and all By-Laws heretofore passed in respect to Statute Labour or Poll Tax are hereby repealed.

2. That the Provisions of Section 4, of the Statute Labour Act as amended by 6, George V. Chap. 42, Sec. 1, 7, George V., Chap. 46, Sec. 1; and as further amended by 8, George V., Chap. 32, Sec. 1, shall apply to, and be in force in the Town of Timmins, and all male inhabitants of the age of 21 years and upwards, and under 60 years of age, not otherwise exempted by Law from performing statutory labour, who have not been assessed upon the assessment roll, shall instead of such labour be taxed at \$5.00 yearly therefor, such taxes to be payable on and after the first day of January, in each year.

3. That where any such male inhabitant has been employed by the same person for not less than 30 days, such employer shall pay over to the Collector on demand out of any wages due to such employee the amount of such taxes and such payment shall absolve the employer from all liability to the employee for the amount so paid.

4. That in order to ensure the prompt and certain collection of the statute labour tax the Clerk shall prepare during the month of January in each year a collector's roll or rolls setting out therein the names of all persons who do not appear to have been assessed for property on the assessment roll of the previous year and who are liable to pay the tax provided for in paragraph 2, and shall deliver the said roll or rolls to the Chief of Police for collection.

5. The Clerk shall add to and revise the said rolls monthly, and also immediately upon the return of the assessment roll by the assessor, and shall notify the said Chief of Police of all additions thereto, and it shall be the duty of the Chief of Police and his Constables under direction of the Treasurer and the Finance Committee to collect the said taxes entered upon the said rolls in accordance with the Statutes and the By-Laws of the Council and to make a return thereof to the Treasurer once in every two weeks during the year. The Chief of Police shall return the roll not later than the 15th of December in each year.

6. That every person liable to pay the sum named in paragraph 2, shall pay the same to the said Chief of Police or other Collector appointed to collect the same within two days after demand therefor by the Collector, and in case of neglect or refusal to pay the same, the Collector may levy the same by Distress and sale of the goods and chattels of the defaulter with costs of Distress; and if no sufficient Distress can be found, the defaulter for his refusal or neglect to pay the said sum, shall incur the penalty of \$5.00, all as provided by the Statute Labour Act.

7. That any person who shall pay the tax of \$5.00 under paragraph 2, who is subsequently assessed in the same year upon the assessment roll of the municipality, shall be entitled to be credited with the said amount against the tax as levied in respect of his Assessment upon presenting his receipt to the Collector of Taxes.

8. That subject to the provisions of paragraph 7, no person shall be exempt from the tax under said paragraph 2, mentioned, unless he produces a certificate that he is assessed or that he has performed statute labour or paid the tax elsewhere in Ontario.

NO INTERFERENCE WITH WITNESSES PERMITTED

Magistrate Makes it Clear That Prompt and Stern Measures Will Follow Attempt to Intimidate

At police court this week I. Lewis was remanded for a week on the charges of forgery performed against him. Mr. A. C. Brown, who is acting for the complainants in the case, called the attention of the magistrate to the complaint of some of his clients that the defence had approached them in regard to the case suggesting that libel suits would be instituted if certain evidence were given. The magistrate promptly made it clear that there would be no interference permitted. "If the accused makes any threats, the police can cancel his bail," he said. No interference with the processes of the law could be tolerated, and anything approaching threats or intimidation would be severely punished. Witnesses will be fully protected.

Mrs. V. Omeo, on a charge of illegally having liquor, was fined \$300.00 and costs. A man who gave material evidence for the police in this case was later given a ten-day jail term for being in charge of a car while drunk.

Nine drunks contributed \$10.00 and costs each, and one other was asked for ten-times that amount of fine, \$100.00 and costs, as a too-frequent offender.

Two gentlemen on charges of speeding were assessed \$10.00 and costs each.

Obstructing the police cost one man \$5.00 and costs.

For having liquor, another man was asked for \$50.00 and costs.
