Free Dental Examination and Advice. Local Dentists Giving Full Support to Health Dept.

The Ontario Dental Health Day to be held on Wednesday, October 20th. will include among its activities an undertaking never yet attempted in connection with a campaign of this

This new feature is the free dental examination and advice to be given by the dentists to all who request it at this time. The importance of this service cannot be over estimated. There are many people who find great difficulty in appropriating and applying knowledge given in a general way, they get scant benefit from the public lecture or the printed page. They need individual advice and instruction. The personal free service to be given by the profession will prove of great benefit to all such people. The dentists are making this contribution at the request of the Ontario Department of Health. The dentists of the Timmins district are giving the most earnest co-operation.

Other activities being organized by the Department are the showing of special dental health films in the theares, the broadcasting of mouth health messages from the various radio stations, dental health plays and newspaper publicity. Addresses on mouth hygiene will be delivered before service clubs and other organizations and mass meetings of school children will be held.

The purpose of the undertaking is to inform the general public in regard to the danger of allowing infection to remain in the mouth and to give instruction in connection with the prevention of dental diseases. many systemic diseases are caused by infection at root ends and Pyorrhea pockets cannot be denied and it is ust as true that many of these conditions can be prevented by sufficient care at the proper time. It has been well established that regular inspecdiet and sufficient mastication of the food will do much to prevent decay

#### MR. HUCKABONE HAD NO PART IN POLL TAX SCHEME

At the famous session of the town | council last Thursday, the mayor left the impression that Mr. W. H. Huckabone, paymaster at the Hollinger, was to receive a commission on the poll tax collected at the mine. This was not according to the facts and Mr. Huckabone last week took immediate steps to disabuse the minds of the people in regard to any such idea. Mr. Huckabone called the attention of the mayor to the misconception, and pointed out that the impression left was an entirely unfair and unwarranted one. To The Advance Mr. Huckabone said: "I did not know anything of the plan until it was decided upon by the council. I had never been offered any commission in the matter. I had no dealings in any way in this respect,-had never been promised anything, asked for anything, or even considered or discussed the question in any way." In view of the impression left by the Mayor, and in fairness to Mr. Huckabone, it is only right to point out & that all he was getting out of the poll tax collection, or expected to get out of it, was a lot of extra work and annoyance, and that he was in no way expecting any commission or other remuneration in connection with the matter, and had absolutely no connection in any way with the scheme.


