## Arch. Gillies, B.A.Sc., O.L.S. "Old-Timer" Thinks Council Made Mess of the Poll Tax Affair

And as Bad a Mistake in the Method of Paying Back the Money Collected Improperly. "Why in the Name of Gravel and Sand Should People be so Unjustly Inconvenienced?" He Wants to Know.

Sir:—Being a regular reader of The Advance, I must say that I admire your straightforward criticism of the 'would-be-rich New Council." Their method of collecting the Poll Tax was out of all reason, and considering the educated men on the Council it is regrettable that they tried to collect it in that way.

One fair lady remarked "Well, I sure helped to put in the "Big Four" and I'll sure help to put them out." Needless to say she got considerable backing from the waiting crowd.


