SIXTY DAYS JAIL TERM FOR ABUSING SICK COW

Another Man Also Goes to Jail for Ten Days for Being Drunk in Charge of an Auto There were only half a dozen cases at police court this week. Four drunks were duly fined. M. Biletzki was sentenced to ten days in jail for being drunk in charge of an automobile.

The special case of the day was one charging Mike Bruski with cruelty to animals. The charge was laid by the Timmins Humane Society, Inspector J. Mackinnon preferring the charge. The evidence showed that a sick cow had been lying on the roadside and Bruski came along to move the cow. Although the cow was evidently too sick to move, bloated up and generally in horrible condition, Bruski is said to have put a rope round its neck and pulled it forcibly along, belting it with the end of the rope. The cow was badly bruised and marked when the Humane Society officials ordered it shot. Bruski admitted "tapping" the cow lightly with the end of the rope, the statements in this regard making the magistrate comment ironically. Dr. Knox gave very clear and useful evidence as to the condition of the cow, its injuries, and the probable causes. There was ample evidence from those seeing the cow abused to warrant a conviction. The magistrate scored the accused for his cruelty and sentenced him to sixty days in jail without the option of a fine.

In bringing this case to court the Timmins Humane Society has done a distinct public service. The sentence and the rebuke administered to the offender by the magistrate should act as a warning and a deterrent to any others who may be tempted to ill-use any animal at any time. In this, its first actual police court case, the Humane Society has done well in "speaking for those who can not speak for themselves."

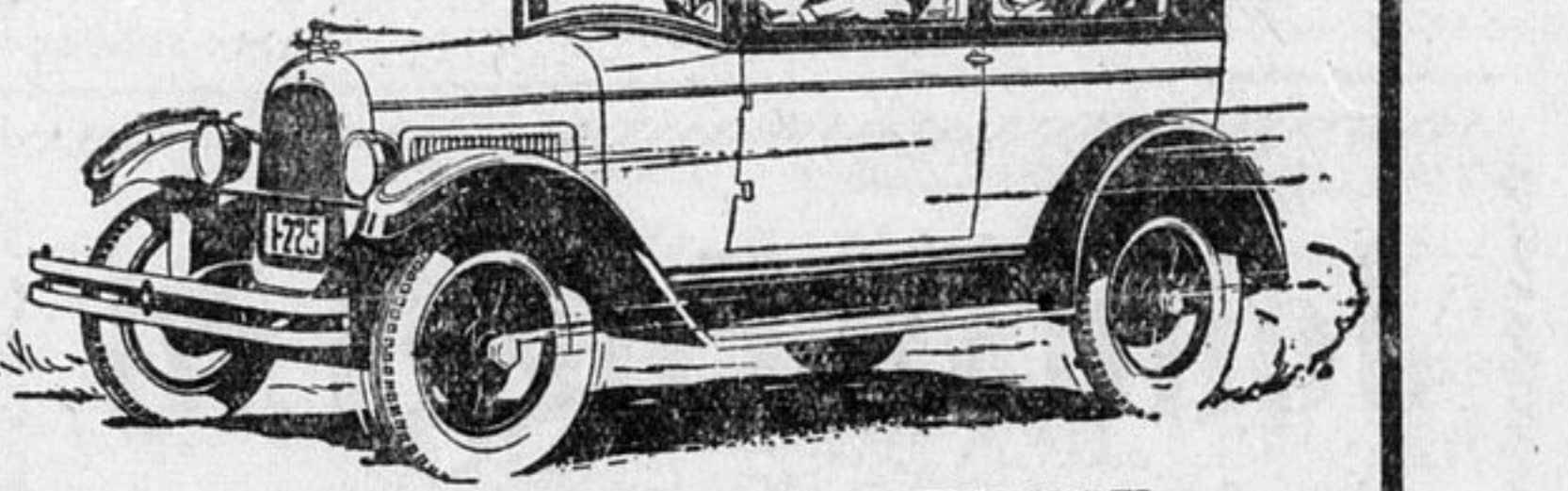
