**BURIAL IN WALES OF THE
LATE WILLIAM THOMAS.**

The following article is from The Amman Valley Chronicle and East Carmarthen News, published at Ammanford, Wales, under date of Sept. 16th—

"Body Brought from Canada—After a journey of between 3,000 to 4,000 miles, the body was brought to Ammanford on Saturday evening last of William Thomas, son of Mrs. Daniel Thomas, Villiers Road, who was fatally burnt whilst at work in a North Canadian gold mine some weeks ago. It took fully a three days' journey to bring the remains, which had been embalmed, to Montreal. They were conveyed by boat to England, and on Wednesday the last phase of the journey took place, when in a little churchyard in Llangadock, the burial took place. The body lay during the intervening period at the home of the bereaved mother, who, sad to relate, lost her husband, following an accident in Tirydail Colliery, in 1915. A large number of Ammanford friends accompanied the remains to their last resting-place in the Llangadock cemetery, where also a large number of the local residents had gathered to pay their last tribute of respect. The officiating ministers were the Revs. T. J. Evans (Gwynfryn), John Morgans (Quay Street), and W. Nantlais Williams (Bethany). During the service the favourite Welsh hymns, "Bydd myrdd o ryfeddodau" and "O Iryniau Caersalem," were sung.
