

### FRANK MCGUIRE SIGNED BY PITTSBURGH THIS YEAR

Former Timmins Hockey Star to Play for Smoky City in National League

All in Timmins follow with the keenest interest the hockey career of Frank McGuire, a hockey star who

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made a big name for himself in the North Land, and since leaving here has added to his laurels by a large measure of fame in big hockey circles across the border. This season Frank McGuire has signed up with Pittsburgh. In a recent issue, The Pittsburgh Sun published a picture of Frank in a recent issue, together with the following sketch:—

"Frank (Mickey) McGuire, former Cleveland and Minneapolis hockey star, was signed up last night by the management of the Pittsburgh professional club of the National Hockey League.

"While it was not made known just what salary McGuire will receive, it is understood that his contract, which is a three-year document, calls for one of the largest salaries in the circuit. McGuire is a forward, being equally efficient at centre and left wing. Last season he was a member of the champion Minneapolis sextet of the Western League; while previous to going to the Twin City he was a teammate of Nelson Stewart at Cleveland.

"Mickey is no stranger to Pittsburgh ice fans. He played at Duquesne Garden several times while a member of the Ohio six.

"McGuire arrived in town yesterday morning from his home in Toronto and after a short conference with the local club owner affixed his name to the dotted line. He left today for Cleveland to visit friends, but will go to Chicago tomorrow and then back to his home in Canada for a few days before reporting here for the training period, which will get started in about 10 days.

#### McGuire is Popular

"Many players tried to make the grade as regulars of the Cleveland team. Many tried and many failed. Of the few who made good, none jumped into popularity quicker than McGuire.

"In less than one season, though compelled to play a type of offensive different than that to which he was accustomed, McGuire blossomed out into one of the real star forwards of the United States Hockey League. On the Cleveland forward line he proved fully capable of standing the hurricane clip set by Stewart, who last winter was voted the most valuable

player in the National Hockey League.

"Not over-burdened by weight, McGuire makes up for that handicap by speed and gameness. Time and again, the opposition has attempted rough tactics with Mickey but always McGuire has given just as good as he has received and shown ability to stand the gaff in an amazing fashion for a man of his size.

"Mac packs a terrific shot and great ability to scamper down the side ice with the puck. His ability to hook shots into the net from a difficult angle gives him rank among the best shooters in the game.

"But McGuire's real worth is his ability to perform in combination. He is a player who does not hog the puck. There is no individualism in his play. His efforts are for the team, making him the type of player much sought but seldom found.

"McGuire comes from Gravenhurst, in the Muskoka lake region of Ontario. At Gravenhurst, McGuire played his first hockey trying his hand at the sport when a wee, little tad. As he grew older his ability soon became recognized, and he finally joined the team at Timmins, Ontario.

"For four seasons McGuire played with Timmins and was reckoned as the star forward of that sextet.

"A settlement of all the pre-season troubles of the National Hockey League will be effected at a meeting to be held in Toronto a week from Saturday. The necessity of another meeting after the annual affair arises in connection with two important matters, the adopting of the playing schedule and the settlement of the Boston hockey player case.

"Owing to the changing of the groups which will play as parts of the N.H.L. this season further work on a new schedule was necessary, and in view of the failure of the special committee to agree on a solution of the Boston problem recently this is another thing that the league must discuss."

### "REGULAR BAPTISTS" TO BE NAME CHURCH GROUP

Rev. M. R. Hall, of Timmins, on Committee Named at Meeting in Toronto Last Week.

There was a heated discussion at the annual convention of Baptist churches of Ontario and Quebec, held at Toronto last week, and the group led by Rev. Dr. T. T. Shields was outvoted. According to Dr. Shields this group will found a college of their own to take the place of McMaster University which they consider is spoiled by "Modernism." The Toronto Globe last week in a report of a meeting on Thursday night said:—

"Supporters of Rev. Dr. T. T. Shields, who was censured by the Baptist Convention of Ontario and Quebec, crowding the Jarvis Street Baptist Church last night, decided by resolution to form an organization within the Convention to maintain their own principles, and to carry on their own missionary and educational work.

"The resolution, which was carried without a dissenting vote, read: "In view of the present situation within the Convention, and the necessity of establishing a fellowship of brethren who hold and practice the doctrines, principles and policies of regular Baptists, as individuals and churches, it is resolved that a committee hereinafter named be appointed to take steps toward the organization of an association of Regular Baptists within the Baptist Convention of Ontario and Quebec to make possible the co-operation of such Regular Baptists in missionary and educational work, and with authority to call a meeting for the formation of such an association at such a time and place as the committee shall determine, it being understood that it is intended that such an organization is to be without prejudice to the churches' status as parts of the Baptist Convention of Ontario and Quebec."

"The committee named at last night's meeting and empowered to add to its numbers was as follows:— Rev. T. J. Mitchell, London; Rev. John Dodds, Wheatley; Rev. C. J. Loney, Hamilton; Rev. C. M. Carew, Fenelon Falls; Rev. Morley Hall, Timmins; Rev. R. K. Gonder, Stratford; Rev. J. Proudfoot, Fingal; Rev. W. E. Smalley, Tiverton, Rev. J. H. Peer, Willowdale; Rev. W. E. Smith, London; Pastor A. E. Campbell; Rev. J. G. Connor, Hamilton; Rev. W. J. Thompson, Long Branch; Pastor Gordon Brown, Orangeville; Pastor W. S. Whitecombe, Markham; Pastor James McGinley, Alton; Rev. John Ford; and Thomas Urquhart, Rev. W. H. Brown, Dr. T. T. Shields, Rev. W. E. Atkinson, Rev. Alexander Thomson, Rev. G. W. Allan, Rev. D. N. Cameron, D. MacLulich, Rev. E. A. Brownlee and E. O. Weston, all of Toronto.

"The resolution was introduced by Rev. T. J. Mitchell of London, and seconded by Rev. Morley Hall of Timmins. Both spoke briefly and then Dr. Shields, chief speaker of the evening, dealt with it.

"Declaring that he and the members of Jarvis Street Baptist Church were "Regular Baptists," he declared that as far as he and his church were concerned not a dollar would be contributed to the Baptist Convention of Ontario and Quebec while it endorsed Professor Marshall of McMaster University.

"He referred to the Convention's action of censure and continued: "I don't feel as if I were cast out. I never was cast out from any group where I never belonged. I am still a member of a Regular Baptist Church. This is a Regular Baptist Church."

"Then his remarks had to do particularly with Professor Marshall of McMaster. Those, he declared, who could not see that the professor was a modernist were "sadly lacking in Biblical intelligence."

"Convention members had denied that machine tactics had been used. "But I declare," said Dr. Shields, "the Convention was packed with delegates in favor of McMaster University."

"Continuing, Dr. Shields stated that, while he would not contribute funds to the Convention for missionary or educational work, he would find other channels through which to carry on the work. A college, he stated, would be started on a modest scale, and this in the not too distant future.

"We're not going to leave the Convention," he said in conclusion. "We're going to stay in and play brother to everybody that needs that help."
