HOW ONTARIO VOTED AT THE LAST PLEBISCITE

Forty-two Voted "Wet" and Sixty-Nine Voted "Dry," According to the Figures.

So much discussion is occurring as to the popularity or unpopularity of the Ferguson Temperance policy, that it is of interest to recall the last plebiscite taken on the Temperance question. It should be remembered, however, that the vote showed a much decreased majority for what is conveniently referred to as the "dry side." Also that no one was handicapped by fear of defeating a capable government by voting "dry." The new adjustment of constituencies also makes a big difference this time. At the plebiscite in 1924 there was only a small majority in favour of the O.T.A. But 69 constituencies voted for the Act and 42 against. The following shows the result by constituencies, the vote cast, and the second column the majority:

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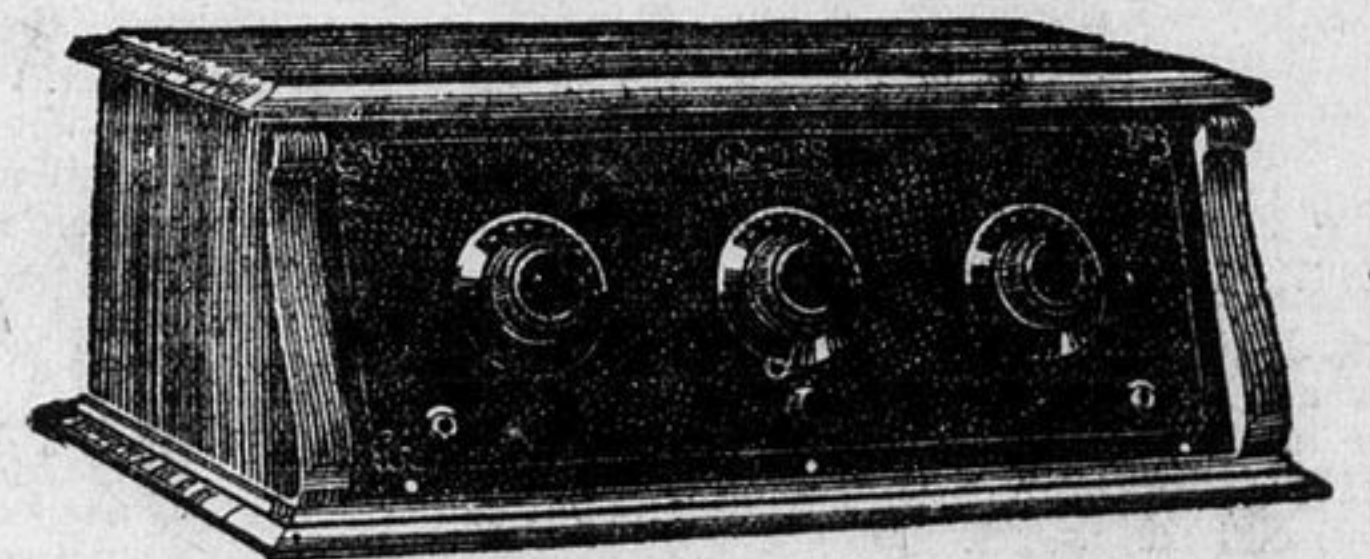
