Rouyn-A New Community Becomes Mining Railhead

Douyn, one of the newest communities in the Province of Quebec, is now in It touch with the rest of the world by means of a branch line, 44 miles in length, which reaches the Quebec-Cochrane main line of the Canadian National Railways at Taschereau (formerly known as O'Brien), a divisional point. Previous to the advent of the branch line, access to Rouyn was by means of land and water route. Now the railway runs directly into the munieipality and provides efficient service for freight and passengers.

As the work of railway construction was progressing, the citizens o Rouyn, encouraged by the solution of transportation problems, effected considerable progress in developing civic improvements and a further programme will be undertaken now that it is possible to obtain supplies expeditiously and more economically.

Rouyn is the centre of a most important gold-copper field, some mines being of proven value, with others offering good prospects and inviting further development. With the completion of the branch line it will be possible to ship in heavy material required for the construction of a smelter for handling ores of the local mines.

The ew branch from Taschereau to Rouyn traverses a territory well wooded, with numerous lakes and streams, a section of which in the vicinity Tois Lake is good agricultural land, offering inducements to colonists.


