## URGE LARGE ATTENDANCE AT ASSOCIATED BOARDS

Annual Meeting at Cochrane on Friday of Next week, Nov. 12th

A letter sent out by the secretary-treasurer of the Northern Ontario Associated Boards of Trade specially urges all boards of trade in the district to have full representation at the annual meeting to be held at Cochrane on Friday of next week, Nov. 12th. In part, the letter says: "In view of the great importance of this meeting, it was felt that Cochrane, being so accessible in the district, would permit a large attendance from each member board. During the coming year it is quite possible that the provincial Government will be able to spend considerably more money in our district than previously, and in order to take full advantage it is essential that the complete organization be held together and that the officers should be selected with great care. We, therefore, urge all the member boards to make a very special effort to have a large representation at Cochrane on November 12th.

The Associated Boards is a combination of all the boards of trade of the North Land for the advancement of the common interests of the country. Very material advantage has been given to the North in the past few years through the efforts of the Associated Boards, following the plan emphasized so effectively by Mr. R. A. McInnis, of Iniquois Falls, when President of the Associated Boards of Trade. "to make the Associated Boards recognized as useful as the Voice of the North."

## SUDBURY HAS LOSS OF \$50,000 THROUGH FIRE

Fire which broke out at a late hour Wednesday night, raging until early Thursday morning last week, caused a loss totalling \$50,000 to four business houses in Sudbury. Starting in the basement of Hagger's Restaurant, Durham Street, the flames spread to Lorne Fowler's hardware store, H. Ironstone's clothing store and the New American Cafe, and also to the New American Hotel, where slight smoke damage was done. Of unknown origin, the blaze was difficult to combat owing to the dense smoke, and for a time all four places of business were threatened with destruction. Only the total loss has as yet been estimated, and most of the damage was incurred through smoke and water. Two firemen, Stanley Wilson and Russell Gatchell, received minor injuries from broken glass, each having his right hand cut.

## MR. A. J. KENNEDY AGAIN CANDIDATE IN TEMISKAMING

At the Conservative convention held at Englehart on Thursday last, Mr. A. J. Kennedy, member for the last session was again nominated as the candidate to carry the Conservative banner. Mr. Kennedy explained that he had intended to retire, but he had been pressed so much by friends that he had decided to allow his name to go before the convention. Five names were submitted to the convention, these being:—W. A. Gordon, Haileybury; Geo. Mitchell and A. K. Roberts, Cobalt; A. J. Kennedy, New Liskeard; and John Clark, Englehart. All withdrew but Messrs Kennedy and Clark, the former winning on the vote and Mr. Clark moving to make it unanimous. The meeting was enthusiastic, the new temperance policy of the Ferguson Government winning special approval.

## EVEN LONDON, ONTARIO, HAS HEARD OF "WHISKERINO"

During the past year Timmins has received special publicity from outside newspapers in connection with two subjects—dry ginger ale, and whiskers. Isn't it irony? Timmins can scarcely be said to deserve fame for drinking dry ginger ale, or for growing whiskers no matter how harmless these two occupations may be.

It is truly remarkable, however, how widespread the fame of the "Whiskerino" contest in connection with the Charity Turkey Stag to be held here on Dec. 17th, has become. ## SHOULD ELECT A STRAIGHT FERGUSON CANDIDATE

The editor of The Northland Post, of Cochrane, is a very strong Liberal, and that is not putting it strongly. The Advance has always thought that The Post would dispute the idea of any Conservative being an angel, or any angel being a Conservative, and, if absolutely convinced that any Conservative was an angel, would then point out that the fluff on the wings was not nearly so nice as on the regular angels. But, while strongly Liberal, the Post is also very strongly for the North Land. It is easy to believe that The Post might be mistaken, but it is more than difficult to think that The Post is at any time otherwise than, fervently for this North. Accordingly, there is special interest in the following editorial from The Post last week. Evidently when The Post really believes that the North is to be advantaged, The Post is ready to curb its Liberalism. The Post, at this crisis advises all to vote for the Ferguson Government. The Post says:—

"Whether we like it or not, Government Control is the platform on which the coming provincial elections will be fought, to the exclusion of any problems which confront the province. It is certainly deplorable that liquor should be the sole topic for the next few weeks and it is to be hoped that after this election, people will forget all about liquor and begin to realize that other weightier matters are clamouring for discussion. But only one way is open to relegate the liquor question to the back seat, and that is to stand solidly behind Premier Ferguson in this election and put his Government back into power. It will never do to elect an independent member, no matter if he promises to vote with Premier Ferguson, just on this question. In such a case it might very easily happen that there will be no Ferguson Government to support and the curse of the O.T.A. will continue unchecked to work its disaster indefinitely, with its trail of poisoning, murders and general lowering of morality throughout the province. No subterfuge will work. We must elect a straight Ferguson supporter if we want to see government control established. That is our strong appeal to the intelligent and fair-minded voter.

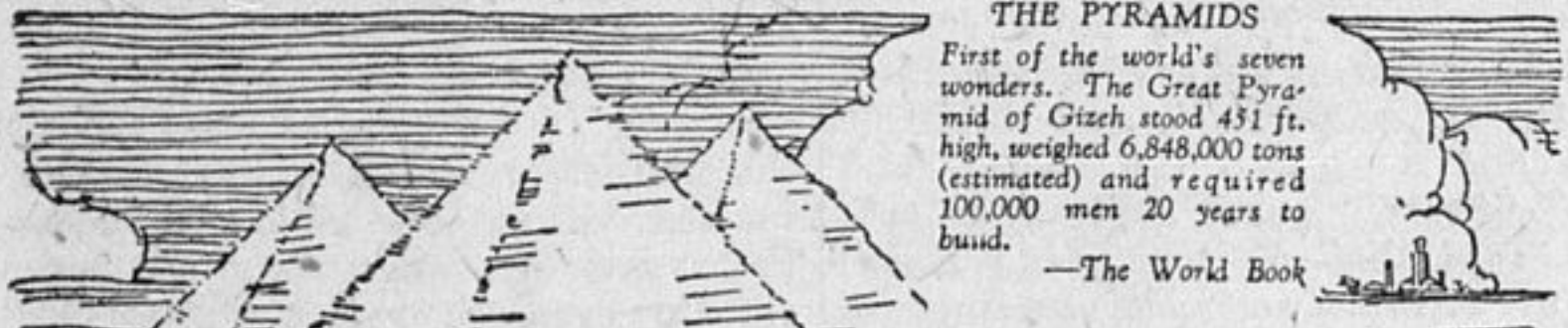

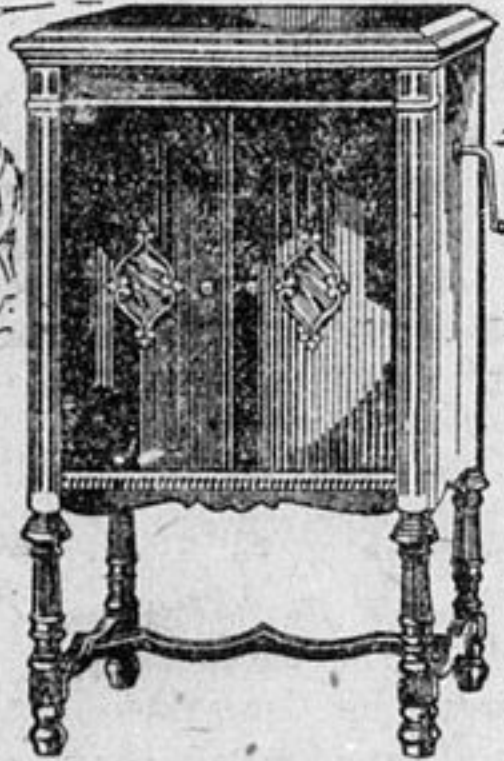
