Mr. Kenning pledged himself to the Ferguson policies throughout. He emphasized the need for roads and * other necessities for this North and showed the keen and helpful interest evidenced at all times by the Government.

Mr. White made an inspiring address, pledging himself wholeheartedly to the Ferguson policies, and dealing effectively and well with many special needs and problems of the North, such as the necessity for railroad extension, the high power rates, silicosis and its remedy, pulpwood matters and other live issues. 
PIONEER BUSINESS MAN

RALPH POOLEY, IN WEST

Popular Timmins Young Man Dies as Result of Fall of Timber in Alberta Coal Mine.
