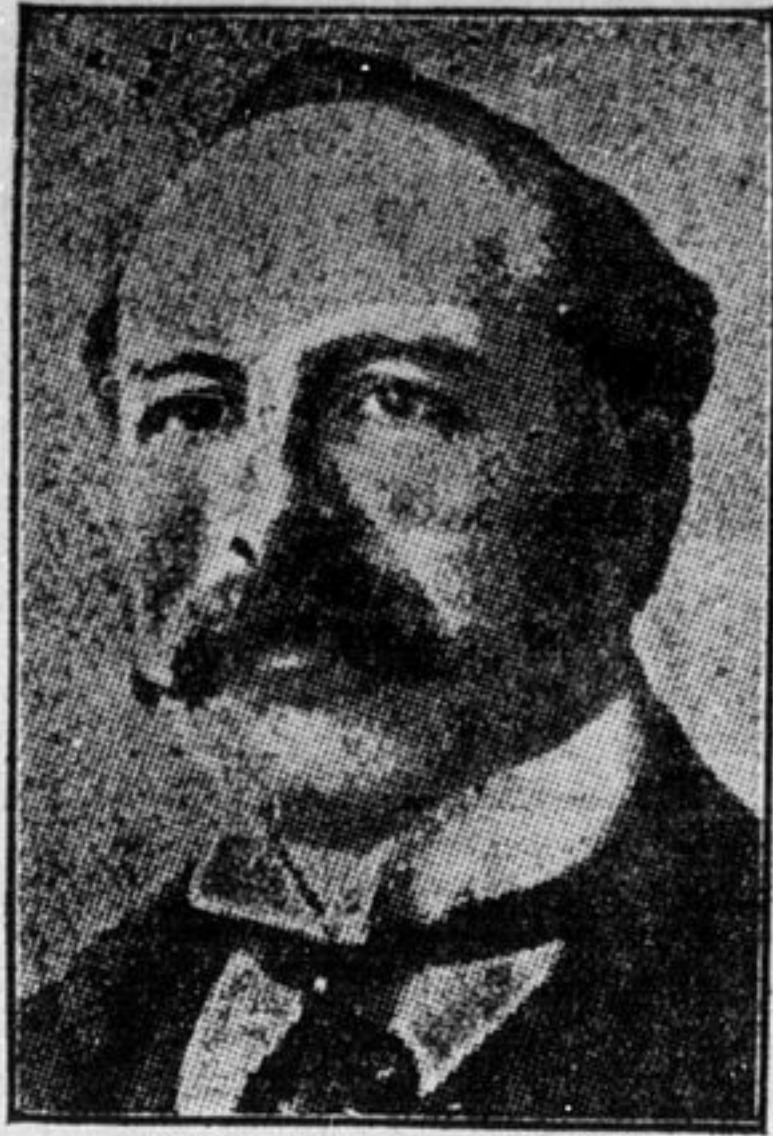

**DRIVER OF DEATH CAR
FACING LIQUOR CHARGES**

Investigations conducted by the
Provincial Police into the death of
George Chambers who was killed on
the North Bay-Sudbury highway, last
week, when a car in which he was
riding turned turtle, have resulted in
the apprehension of John McDonald,
the driver of the auto, on charges
of consuming liquor in other than a
private place, illegal purchase and
illegal transportation. George Thom-
as, manager of the Gauthier House
at Hahnapiatae, is also charged with
keeping liquor for sale, it being al-
leged that he sold a bottle of high-
wines to McDonald, which was said
to have been discovered under the up-
turned car.

McDonald is road foreman for the
Northern Development at Stinson
and was formerly a member of the
Copper Cliff police force. Both
cases were remanded until Friday of
this week, bail being set at \$500. A
preliminary inquest was held Thursday
afternoon before Coroner Torrington
who granted an enlargement until to-
day to allow the Crown to secure
further witnesses.

The accident occurred about 10.30
o'clock on Monday night, Nov. 1st,
one mile east of Wahnapiatae. Mc-
Donald claims to have been tempo-
rarily blinded by an approaching
car which failed to dim its lights, his
automobile skidding into a four-foot
ditch where it turned turtle. All
three occupants were pinned beneath
the seats. Johnson was the first to
extricate himself. He assisted Mc-
Donald out, but their combined efforts
were not sufficient to release Cham-
bers. Two passing motorists, Fred
and Emil Langlois, of Markstay, as-
sisted in raising the car but Chambers
was dead, the back of the front seat
being pressed tightly against the back
of his neck, causing death from suffo-
cation.
