WATER HEATERS-Used in conjunction with cooking ranges connected so as to prevent the two from being used simultaneously, can be used during the whole month at a rate of 4-10 of a cent, per watt, per month or a flat rate of \$4.00 per month on a 1.000 watt heater (1 k.w.)

SIGN OR WINDOW LIGHTING An optional (flat) rate of 1c. per watt of installed lamps is being offered. STREET LIGHTING-We are offering to the Municipality the following advantages as well as a considerable reduction in rates, viz:-8% reduction with 25% more light.

1. Present lamps to be replaced by larger lamps at the request of the Municipality.

2. Additional lamps to be installed on the instructions of the Munici- tion of officers for the ensuing term pality.

3. Ornamental lamps, such as are already installed at the corners of Pine Street and Third Avenue to be installed where called for by the Municipality.

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
