There were over 20,000 eligible to vote according to the lists, and it would appear that only about onethird of the electors exercised their franchise. The usual percentage of those voting at elections in this country is only about 25 to 50 per cent. of the total vote. The recent election showed only about a third of the voters exercising their franchise. One reason for the comparative smallness of the vote was the very inclement weather around election time and the difficulties made for travelling through the heavy snow.

In the election there were probably more than the usual number of spoiled ballots, there being 122 ballots counted among the spoiled and rejected. As there were over a hundred polls however, this is after all only a small number, though the most of the polls did not have any spoiled ballots.
