SHOULD BE ONE OFFICER TO EACH THOUSAND PEOPLE

In the last issue of The Simcoe Reformer there is a letter that contains a paragraph that will be of more than passing interest to most people in this town. From The Reformer it would appear that one Simcoe man, who has suffered from no less than six recent burglaries, wrote to Alfred Cuddy, assistant commissioner, Ontario Provincial Police, making the very natural suggestion that he was surely entitled to better police protection than he had been receiving. The assistant commissioner did not give the Simcoe man much help or comfort. In fact, it was the usual case of "passing the buck." The assistant commissioner suggested that the business men of Simcoe should get together and take the matter up with the town council with a view to securing more adequate police protection. It must be admitted that the assistant commissioner did point out the method by which the matter could be most effectively righted. It is, however, the concluding paragraph of the assistant commissioner's letter that is likely to make the most striking impression on the general reader here. "I might mention," Assistant Commissioner Cuddy says, "that police protection should average at least one officer to each thousand people, and in some places they average one officer to every eight hundred citizens."

If Timmins followed the proportions suggested by the assistant commissioner there would be fifteen officers here. On the other hand the town had six officers when its population was twelve thousand, or just half as many as the Provincial authority suggests. At the same time it must be said that Timmins was orderly and law-abiding at that time, and no need for further police protection was apparent. The fact is that in police officers as in other walks of life, quality counts. A few good men in a good town will do better than more men not so good in a town that is not as orderly.

TROUBLE IN MEXICO DUE LARGELY TO BOLSHEVIKS

Censorship of Newspapers Prevents World From Hearing the Facts Says Rev. Fr. Dumont in Address on Mexico.

Rev. Father Dumont, Dominican Missionary, gave an address on the situation existing at present in Mexico, to the members of the Timmins Knights of Columbus, and their ladies on Friday evening in the Parish hall. The address was most interesting and informative and in brief, terse but impressive way gave the gathering a very graphic description of the present troubled state in Mexico and the conditions that led up to it. Owing to the severe weather, the attendance was not as large as it would otherwise have been, but all present were agreed that the Reverend Father's lecture was well worth braving the fiercest storm to hear, as he gave clear and first-hand information on a question of vital and world-wide importance.

Rev. Fr. Dumont spoke briefly but told the complete story in powerful way. He pointed out that owing to the rigid censorship in force the newspapers had not been able to send out the true story of Mexico. He believed that the real commencement of the trouble had been the visiting of Mexico by paid Russian Bolsheviks who had carried on an agitation among the people, based on misrepresentation and ill-will, and who had been able to influence the government of Mexico and secure measures for the persecution of the Church and its faithful followers. Rev. Fr. Dumont commented on the fact that in other countries the evil work of Bolshevism was being carried on. There were the same type of agents at work to injure the church and the state in many countries, some not very far from Canada. It might be well to be on guard, he thought. The speaker explained how the government had closed all the churches in Mexico, and exiled the priests, the brothers and the nuns. In many cases the church buildings had been torn down or burned. Priests had been cruelly used and there had been many brutal murders. He had seen nine good priests hanged on the one tree by government officials without any form of trial, and for no crime, except that of being loyal to their church. Priests had actually been killed at the altar while saying mass. The government's brutal purpose was to close all churches and all Christian schools, and to prevent every Catholic from partaking of any of the sacraments of the church or worshipping in the faith he held. The Catholics in Mexico had suffered and were suffering grievously, and their very suffering at this Christmas time must remind them of the tortures undergone by their Saviour whose birth they celebrated at Christmas, and who was reviled and persecuted on earth in the centuries long ago, even as the people in Mexico suffered today for His sake.

Rev. Fr. Theriault occupied the chair during the evening in his usual pleasing way. Rev. Fr. J. O'Gorman, on behalf of the Timmins K. of C., moved a very hearty vote of thanks to the speaker for his excellent informative address. Rev. Fr. O'Gorman spoke briefly on the origin and characteristics of the people of Mexico, showing how they would be more or less easy victims for such a conspiracy as had undoubtedly been planned against them.

During the evening Mrs. Gauthier delighted all with a very attractive pianoforte solo. A solo by Mr. Lucien Pare was another selection much appreciated. Light refreshments were served by the ladies and this part of the programme was also much enjoyed.

SUDDEN DEATH OF MR. FELIX CHARON ON SATURDAY

Large circles of friends and acquaintances will learn with much regret of the death of Mr. Felix Charon at his home in Moneta on Saturday last. He was around as usual in the morning, but about 12.30 noon dropped over dead. While he had been in poor health for the past couple of years, his death came as a very decided shock to the family, being most sudden and unexpected.

The late Felix Charon was a native of Quebec Province, and was 65 years of age at the time of death. He had been a popular resident of the camp since the very early days. For several years he was employed at the Hollinger, being a blacksmith by trade.

Four daughters are left to mourn his loss, and to these the sympathy of all will be extended. His wife predeceased him a number of years ago. The daughters are:—Mrs. A. Lalonde, Mrs. Chas. White and Mrs. Frank Bouchard, of Timmins, and Mrs. Lawrence Lutz, of Ottawa.

The funeral took place on Tuesday morning to St. Anthony's church and the R.C. cemetery, Requiem high mass being said by Rev. Fr. Theriault.
