After a lively election contest, Mrs. J. A. Thomas on Monday was elected Reeve of Tisdale with a majority of 68 over her nearest opponent. Mrs. Thomas accordingly has the distinction of being the first woman to be Reeve of a township in Canada, and one of the very few elected to municipal office in this country. With a long and successful business experience and knowledge of the township and the North her term in office should be marked by efficient administration satisfactory to the people of the municipality.

St. Paul thought the tractor snow-plough should accomplish more, and spoke of the good work he had done while on the council and of his wish to have another try at it. Mr. Helmer reiterated the fact that perhaps he knew more of what economy meant than most people. Mr. Kincaid in a neatly-worded speech asked for the people's support and promised faithful stewardship. On Monday evening again many gathered at the Majestic Theatre for a word from the successful candidates as is the custom, but none of those elected appearing, the people dispersed. However we learned that Mrs. Thomas, Reeve-elect, had just come in from speaking to her adherents at Schumacher and was then on her way down to the Majestic. However it was too late to get the people re-assembled and instead of listening to our lady-reeve, we are now looking forward with pleasure to see the fulfilment of her promises of economy, better adjustment of municipal affairs, etc.

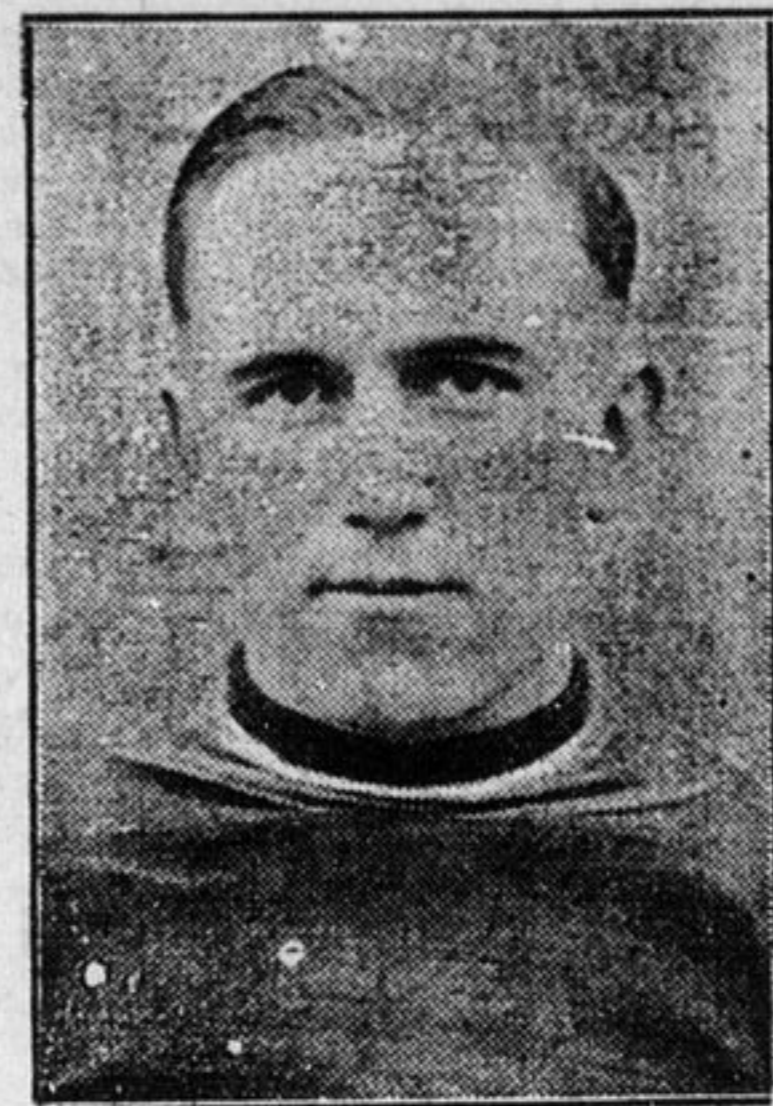
Besides Mrs. Thomas as Reeve, three Councillors are now conceded to this part of Tisdale, one J. Robertson of the Dome, being new to the work, the other two J. J. St. Paul and G. F. Helmer having served well formerly. The one Councillor from Schumacher, J. G. Harris, is the only member of last year's council re-elected and if he is as fair this year to all parts of the township as he was last year, the outlook is bright, that with the varied interests of the different members of

the Council all parts of the township will receive due attention. Monday evening the report issued here gave J. E. Williams, of Schumacher, the election over G. F. Helmer, but on Tuesday forenoon this was found to be a mistake, and although Mr. Helmer had gone contentedly back to the old farm he was called up this morning and told that he was again to be one of the Council fathers.

The voting on the granting of a new franchise with the Light and Power Co. was favorably received, passing by a majority of four hundred and twenty.

At police court last Thursday there were three drunks who paid the usual fine and one man, a citizen of South Porcupine, has three charges of indecent assault against him. This case was remanded for a week to enable him to get a lawyer and it is possible that additional charges may be made. The case is of a most revolting nature and will possibly be taken in camera.

On Tuesday evening the Literary and Musical Society met at the home of Mr. and Mrs. H. M. Martin, where they listened to a most interesting talk by Mr. Martin on "Parsons I Have Known." In his list, Mr. Martin included eccentric parsons, musical parsons, athletic parsons and sporting parsons, with witty anecdotes and laughable incidents in the lives of all, from the parson who insisted on having his congregation all come in by the back door because a hen-pheasant had made her nest in the porch of a church in England, to the time in the early days of Porcupine Camp when Bishop Anderson, while dressed in his clerical attire entered into conversation with some men who were engaged in cutting down trees for the old Dome Road. One man remarked that a white-collared man like the Bishop knew nothing about hard work, that he could not cut down a tree. The Bishop asked for the man's axe, pulled off his coat and started in and much to the man's amazement had five trees felled in considerably faster time than he could himself. The men all gathered round to shake hands with the parson who could beat them at their own work.

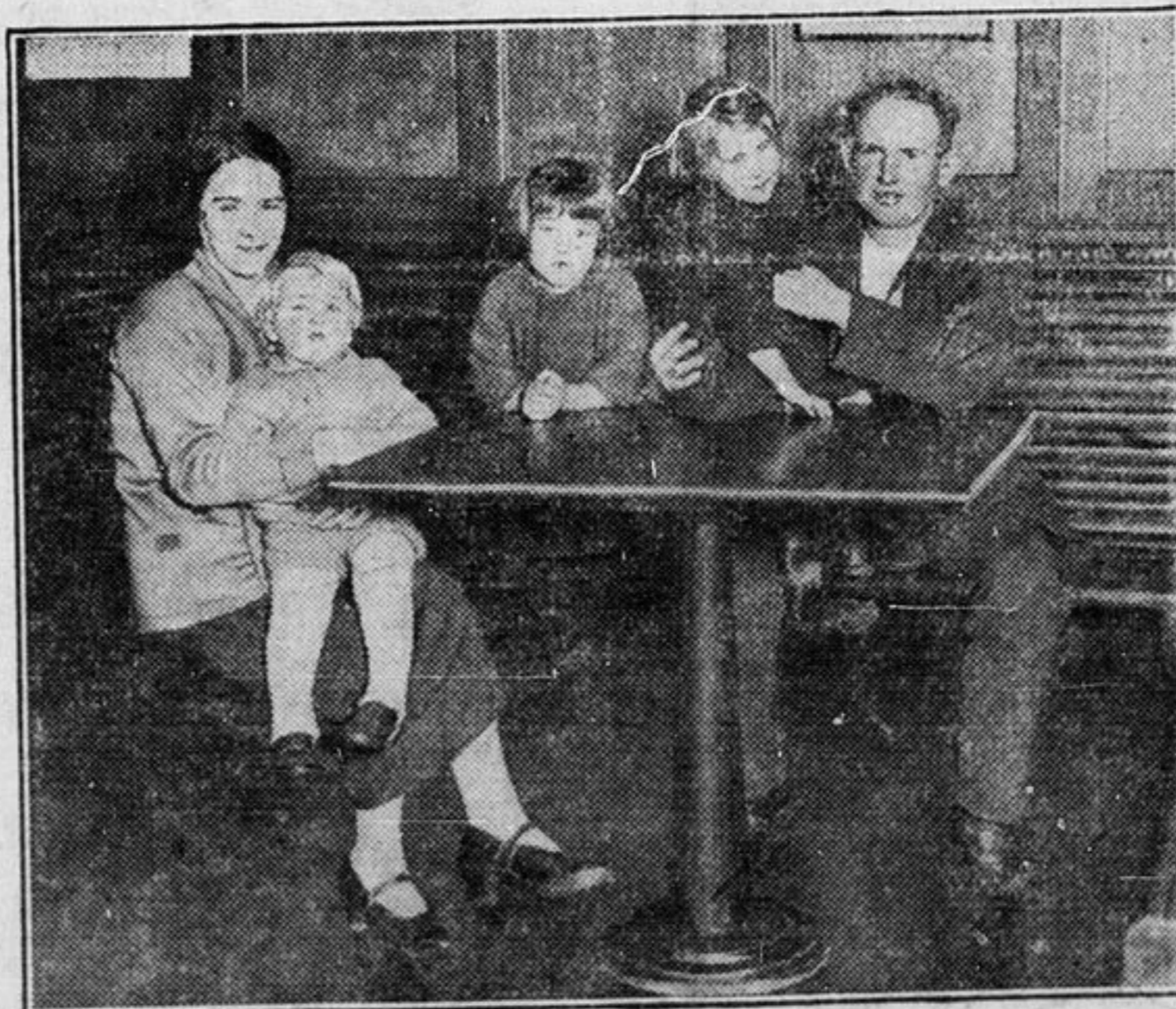
