HUMANE SOCIETY TO HAVE A UNIFORMED OFFICER

To Look After Animals in Town and District, and See They are Properly Treated.

The local Humane Society have plans well under way now to secure an officer in uniform to look after the proper treatment of animals in this district. For some time past it has been known that there has been much suffering among the animals. In some cases it has been a matter of straight cruelty. In many other instances the trouble has been that people did not understand just what their thoughtlessness or parsimony meant to the poor animals. Since the Humane Society has been active in Timmins and district it is true that one man was sent to jail for brutal treatment of a sick animal, but it is not so generally known, though equally true, that scores of other cases have been dealt with where the trouble really was more lack of thought than anything else. In these cases it was more a question of educating the people in regard to the proper treatment of animals. The more cases that have been taken up, the more others seem to come to notice. It is felt now that the growing work of looking after the care of animals in the camp can not be done by any volunteer worker or workers. Accordingly a plan is now on foot to secure a salaried officer, one in uniform who will thus have standing and authority and who will devote all his time and attention to the work. It is intended to secure a man who knows animals and who also has the necessary experience and tact to handle people without unnecessary friction. With this end in view a subscription list was started last week. The response from the business and professional men of the town was very generous. It is expected that the mines and other industries in the district will give the movement hearty support, financially and otherwise. The new officer will be expected to bend every effort to protect all animals—dogs, cats, horses, cows, pigs, every dumb beast,—from abuse and ill-treatment, and to see that they are properly housed, fed, and cared-for.

There will be a regular meeting of the local Humane Society in the town hall, on Friday evening of this week, Dec. 10th, and it is likely that at this meeting the matter of the appointment of an officer to devote all his time to the work will be taken up.

All interested should make a point of attending the meeting on Friday evening, as the need for the appointment of a permanent officer seems to be urgent for the protection and advantage of the many animals in the district.

NEW TRACTOR SNOW PLOW BOUGHT BY TECK TOWNSHIP

The Northern News last week says: "A new Fordson tractor snow plough has been purchased by Teck Township, but as yet has not been in operation. The new plough, which will be drawn by a caterpillar tractor, is much heavier than the plough being used on the roads at present, and has a stretch of 14 feet. The tractor to which the plough will be attached, is not available at present and the new plough has not been tried out. Township officials are anxiously waiting to see the plough in operation."

WORLD'S POULTRY CONGRESS AT OTTAWA NEXT SUMMER

Dante Marchiori, President of the Royal Experiment Station of Poultry Keeping, Rovigo; Professor Cav. Uff Alessandro Ghigi, Director of the Royal Experimental Station of Poultry Keeping, Rovigo; Professor Comm. Nello Fotticochia, Inspector General of the Technical Services of Agriculture, Rome; and Carlo Pacchetti, President of the National Institute of Rabbit Keeping, Alessandria.

LAD OF 17 LOSES HIS LIFE IN STORM NEAR TEMAGAMI

The storm last week claimed one victim in the Temagami district where a young man of 17 years of age, John William Guppy, of Temagami, died from exposure a few miles from his home. The body was found late Wednesday afternoon. Referring to the tragedy, The Northern News says: "An inquest will not be held according to the police. Inspector Moore to whom the tragedy was reported, has been in communication with the coroner at North Bay, within whose jurisdiction the case comes, and formal enquiry is not considered necessary. According to information reaching here, the youth started out on Tuesday morning on a hunting excursion. He was accompanied only by his collie dog. About five o'clock in the afternoon he was seen by some other people, who advised him to return home, it is said, but when he did not come in a search party started out to look for him. This party was headed by the lad's father, but the gathering storm forced the searchers to abandon their task until the morning. Late on Wednesday afternoon the youth was found dead in the snow near the southwest bay of Nett Lake, the police say. The dog it is reported, returned home alone. Guppy died from 'exposure.'"
