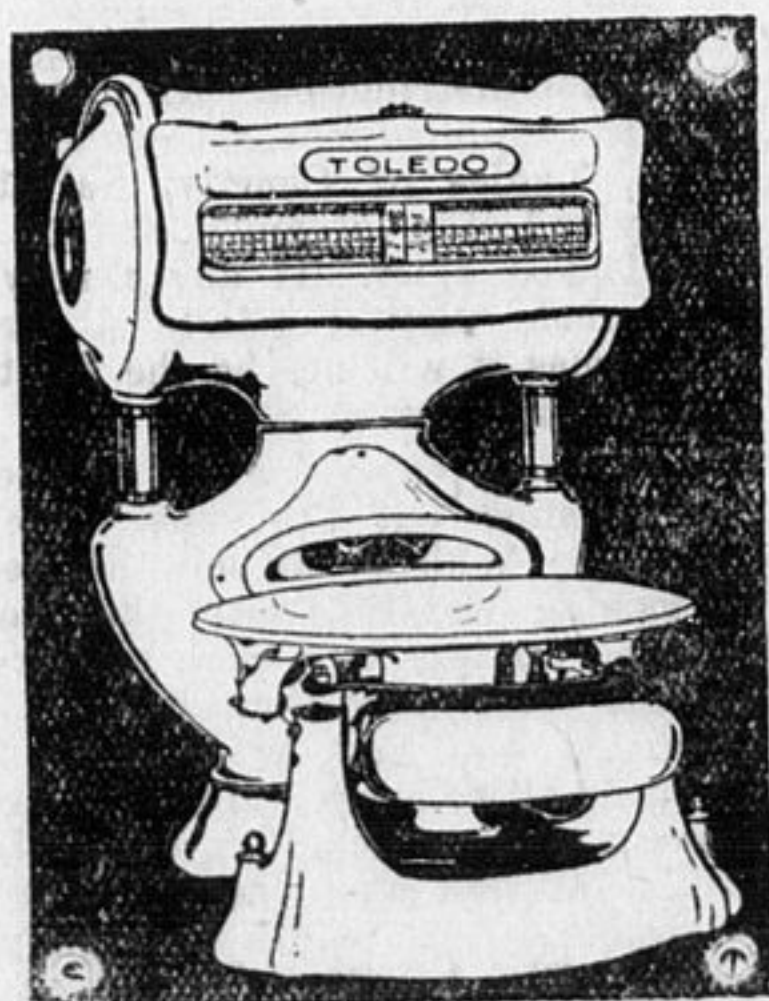

ATTRACTIVE PROGRAMME AT BAND CONCERT SUNDAY

Large Audience Well Pleased With Excellent Programme of Music After Church Services on Sunday

The large audience at the Goldfields Theatre Sunday evening, after the church services, was well pleased with the excellent programme furnished for the last band concert to be given this year. The carol singing expected for the occasion was missed from the programme through no fault of the band. Two separate groups of carol singers had agreed to furnish this Christmas touch to the event, but one after the other they disappointed the band in this, the second disappointment not being known until Saturday when it was too late to secure another group for the carol singing. However, the programme as presented was an excellent one and was much appreciated by all the music-lovers present. For some in the gallery a couple of the numbers were spoiled by the rowdiness and ill-manners of a few unsophisticated young men and women who apparently had wandered into the theatre by mistake. Their silly noisy restlessness disturbed the programme to some extent on a couple of occasions during the evening, and it is to be hoped that good sense and good sportsmanship will hereafter keep this class away, so that those who enjoy the good music may be free to do so without interference.

The selections by the band were very pleasing ones and given with skill, vim and effectiveness. "Fra Diavolo" was a popular band number, while the march "Deeds of Daring" was specially well presented. The waltz, "Cornflowers and Poppies," was an attractive selection that was much appreciated, as was also the opening march, "Amphion."

The soloist for the evening was Mr. R. Smith, who, by special request, sang, "The Deathless Army." Mr. Smith's rich baritone voice, his sympathetic interpretation and his musical talent made this number an outstanding one on the evening's programme. He was insistently encoored and responded with another selection that found general favour. Bandmaster Wolno played the accompaniment on the piano.

Another special favourite of the evening was the talented young violinist, Master Jack Neilson. His first selection, "Blumenlied," was given with a talent and finish that won very decided encore. His second selection, "Hambroesque," was another fine number unusually well presented. Mr. W. A. Devine played the piano accompaniments for these numbers.

Saxophone solos by Bandsman T. Stephens, with Mr. James Ormston, accompanying on piano, were also much appreciated selections on the programme, these well-rendered numbers winning very enthusiastic encores.

Cornet solos by Bandsman Walter Williams also found very general favour among the music-lovers. The first number, "Will Ye No' Come Back Again?" was a fine selection and the response to the encore ("The Lost Chord") was equally pleasing.

The regular night for the next band concert would be January 3rd, but on account of the holiday season this will be skipped, the next concert to be held on Jan. 17th. Further announcement will be made later.

Poultry and Pet Stock Show December 31 and January 1

Fourth Annual Event to be Held in the Union Hall, Second Avenue, on Friday and Saturday of Next Week. Attractive List of Prizes, Cups, Trophies and Specials.

The fourth annual Porecupine Poultry and Pet Stock Show will be held in the Miners' Union Hall, Second Avenue, Timmins, (across from the Porecupine Power & Telephone Co. office) on Friday and Saturday of next week, Dec. 21st and Jan. 1st.

Previous shows have been both successful and attractive, but this year's event is confidently expected to outdo all past events in every particular.

Already there are several entries made from out-of-town, some from a distance, attracted by the fame built up by the Poultry and Pet Stock Show. No one interested in poultry or pet stock should miss this big event on Dec. 31st, and Jan. 1st. Any poultry fanciers or those having dogs or cats or other pets should see the secretary, Mr. J. H. Skelly, regarding entries for the show.

The prize lists issued show a goodly array of prizes, cups, trophies, etc. There are 11 classes listed. 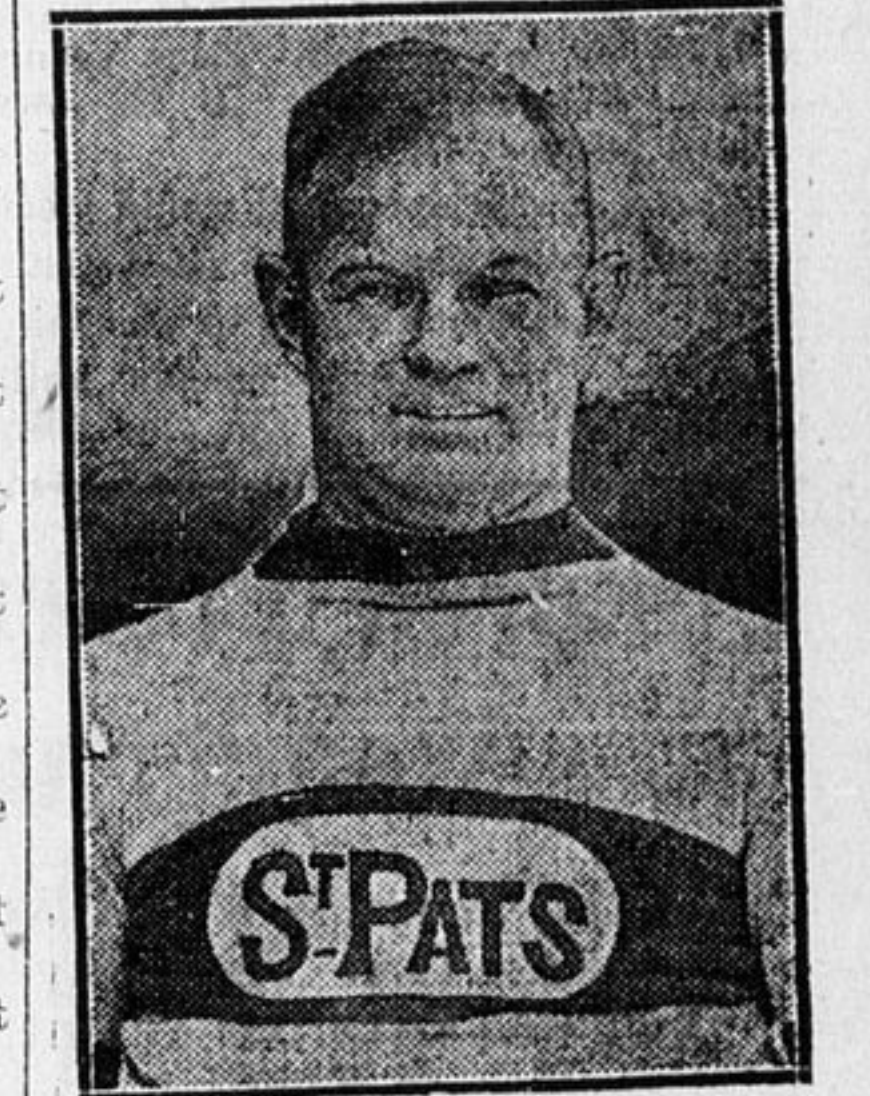
