MINT REFINING GOLD FROM ONTARIO MINES.

In an address to a club at Ottawa last week Mr. A. J. Baker, chief clerk and accountant at the Dominion Royal Mint said that a revenue of about \$75,000.00 would be made this year by that institution for refining gold from Ontario mines. Mr. Baker said that gold is now coming to the Mint for refining at the rate of \$2,000,000 per month.

After reviewing the processes in the making of Canada's coinage, Mr. Baker declared that it is fairly obvious that the future of the Mint must consist in functioning chiefly or to a great extent along the lines of a refinery, as, with a population of only around nine millions in Canada, the plant can not be kept running steadily at anything like capacity in the simply line of making of coinage.
