COUNCIL DID NOT PASS THE TAX RATE LAST WEEK

By-law Not Passed. Other **Business Done**

There was a special meeting of the town council on Thursday evening last, but contrary to the general expectation and the odd report since, the council did not pass the necessary by-law to fix the tax rate for 1926. There was a general discussion on the rate, and a suggestion was made that the rate be 50 mills for public school supporters and 64.9 mills for separate school supporters, but no by-law to this effect was submitted, so the meeting ended with the tax rate still not fixed as required by law. - Councillor Longmore pointed out that the rate suggested would not meet the liabilities for the year. He also pointed out that while we are sure of Crea and the Premier, no definite pro-Robert F. Francis, proposed by mise had been made in regard to the extra royalty that would be paid, and in any case no money would be available from this source until next year. Councillor Longmore also objected to the leaving out of consideration the amount that would have to Harry Alden Morin, proposed by be paid for bank interest, several thousands, and also the proportion of arrears of taxes suggested as collectable.
