Report for the First Term of the Timmins High School

Below are given the names of all pupils in the several forms, that obtained an average of fifty per cent, or better on their term examinations. The pupils are graded according to merit and classified according to standing. For first class honours, 75% or better; for second class honours, from 66 to 74%; for third class honours from 60 to 65%; Pass standing from 50 to 60%.

Reports showing the standing of each pupil in each subject were handed out on the last day of school and should be read carefully by the parents and their significance noted. They should be signed and returned at the beginning of next term. School reopens after the holidays on Monday, January 3, 1927.
