## Eighth Annual Convention of Temiskaming Firemen

To be Held at Iroquois Falls on Thursday, February 3rd. Interesting Programme. Iroquois Falls Fire Brigade Will Banquet the Visitors in the Evening.

The eighth annual convention of the Temiskaming Firemen's Association will be held at Iroquois Falls on Thursday, Feb. 3rd. The Temiskaming Firemen's Association includes thirteen fire brigades:— Timmins, Cobalt, Schumacher, South Porcupine, New Liskeard, Iroquois Falls, Ansonville, Haileybury, Ville Marie and Kapuskasing. Chief H. M. Wilson, of South Porcupine, is the president of the Association, Chief John Mathieson, Cobalt, the vice-president; and Chief F. E. Thompson, of New Liskeard, the secretary-treasurer. The programme for the convention at the Falls on Feb. 3rd, will start with a business session at 9.30 a.m. in Columbus hall, after the delegates are duly welcomed by the Mayor of Iroquois Falls, Mr. F. K. Ebbitt. At 2 p.m. there will be another business session. At 5.15 p.m. it is intended to take the delegates on a tour of the

Abitibi Power & Paper Company's big mill at Iroquois Falls. In the evening, commencing at 7 p.m. there is to be a banquet tendered to the visitors by the Iroquois Falls Fire Brigade. This will be one of the big features of the convention, as the fine hospitality of the Iroquois Falls people is well known. Fire Chief T. H. Wilkes, of the Iroquois Falls Fire Brigade, will be the toastmaster at the banquet, and there will be the usual interesting addresses. Among the speakers expected for the occasion is Mr. E. J. Zavitz, Chief Forester of Ontario.

During the evening there will be shown a special fire picture loaned for the occasion by the Dominion Fire Chief's Association.

Troupe From North Bay Delighted All Here. Making Tour of the North Land

The members of the Timmins K. of C. and their friends enjoyed a most interesting and pleasing evening on Wednesday last, the occasion being the visit of the Italian Orchestra from North Bay in charge of Rev. Fr. Murray. The musical programme was a delightful one indeed, and much appreciated and enjoyed, the selections by the visiting musicians being given with the greatest talent and effectiveness. All were thoroughly pleased with the excellent music furnished by this very gifted orchestra. The special feature of the evening, however, was the address of Rev. Fr. Murray. Murray gave a most entertaining sketch of his life from the time he was fourteen years of age and went to Rome from Ireland to study. He described the city of Rome as it appeared to him then and it seemed later. Another big hit of the evening was the dancing of the Irish Jig. "We are very sorry the gentleman is not present," said Rev. Fr. Murray, who added that the gathering was not going to be disappointed in having this dance, as he would dance it himself.
