

South Porcupine Wins the Second Match in N.O.H.A.

the second win in the Northern group of the N.O.H.A. It is rumoured today, but at time of writing had not been officially confirmed, that the Falls team were dropping out, hence defaulting the other two games to be played to Porcupine Hockey Club. The score for Wednesday's game was 9-3, the home goals being scored by Spence 5, Gregg 2, Briden 1, Palangio 1. The Falls players showed decided strength in the first two periods, but Bingham's citadel proved practically impenetrable. The training of the Porcupine Club showed up to decided advantage in the third period where they were still fresh while the Falls went to pieces.

On Saturday night close to 700 fans watched the combat between Porcupine Hockey Club and Toronto Canoe Club. The visitors were much lighter than the home team but were good skaters and played good combination but with Bingham, the invincible, in the goal, and a stone wall defence such as Fell and Palangio make, they found it impossible to tally often. For over half of the first period there was no score, then from a face-off Spence made a great try and the puck was kept passing pretty well from Gregg to Quinn to Spence. Quinn's shot went wild; then Spence got the puck and on a pass to Gregg made the first goal and before the bell rang Spence scored two more himself. Just shortly before the close, Careless, of Toronto, got struck on the nose by a stick handle accidentally, and was carried off the ice but, though looking rather white, was back again for the second period. Soon after the opening of this period Huggins, who was proving one of their strongest, worked right through the defence and scored the first for Toronto, and in quick succession on a good pass from Palangio, Spence scored the fourth on a pass from Spence, Briden scored the fifth and on a pass from Fell, Gregg scored a sixth for Porcupine. Toronto then stormed Bingham and he was kept busy and just before the bell rang Toronto's defence, Burry, took the puck and alone rushed the Porcupine defence, successfully scoring the second for the visitors. In the third period on a pass from Palangio, Spence tallied the seventh and then some time later, by some clever manipulation on his own, scored the eighth. The ninth tally was made by a pass from Briden to Gregg and soon Toronto got the puck and on a pass from Neeve to Huggins their third goal was scored. The game was clean and good to watch throughout, our own boys taking three of the four penalties, for minor infringements. W. G. Bowles acted as referee. Line-up:—Toronto—Goal, Verney; defence, Huggins and Burry; centre, Richardson; wings, Careless and Dibbele; subs., Love, Neeve and Spradborow. Porcupine—Goal, Bingham; (3rd period Levine), defence, Fell and Palangio; centre, Gagnon; wings, Gregg and Spence; subs., Hughes, Quinn and Briden. After the match the young ladies of the town entertained the two clubs at the home of Mr. and Mrs. Sampson, West Dome Lake. The rooms were decorated with the Porcupine colours and a very pleasant time was enjoyed. On Sunday morning the visitors were shown over the Dome and left on the noon train for Iroquois Falls, expressing great appreciation of their reception by Porcupine, it being said that Porcupine fans were the most encouraging with their applause for visitors of any place they had been.

Baggio received a handsome 17-jewel and engraved watch with his name, the event, etc., engraved on the back. Mr. Baggio is now at the home of his sister, Mrs. V. Mazumato, Golden avenue, but purposes returning to Montreal in the Spring. Meanwhile he is keeping in training by a sort of treadmill bicycle which was shipped from Italy for his especial use.

There was considerable excitement downtown to-day when the alarm was given for a fire in the municipal garage where the township tractor is housed. The building was blazing merrily by the time it was seen, but the prompt action of the brigade prevented the more serious loss of the tractor, although the building itself is pretty well damaged. The mechanical part of the tractor is undamaged but the seat, hood, etc. is scorched considerably. The fire was caused, we believe, by the fumes of gasoline getting too close to a heater that is kept in the building. This is the second time this building has been on fire, the brigade being called out last fall to quench a blaze there.

Hollinger and Porcupine Hockey Clubs met in the Mines League series on Monday night at South Porcupine arena, when the home boys white-washed the visitors to the tune of 9-0. It appeared at first as though the Hollinger aggregation was stronger opposition than on their previous visits here, but when the Porcupines began piling up goals they seemed to lose their morale and their combination, etc., went to pieces. In the first period the visitors gave Bingham plenty to do. At one time Fell secured around his own goal to the vis-a-vis goalie, but though his effort was persistent he did not get a chance to tally. From a face-off Briden, Spence and Hughes did some good work that made the first counter. By a long shot and good pass from the centre Spence placed the rubber in a second time. On a pass from Spence, Gagnon scored a third goal; the light was flashed as a notice, but as it looked rather doubtful, Gregg sent it back to make assurance doubly sure. Palangio started out with the puck for the 4th counter but tripping and falling, it was grabbed by Gregg and pushed over the line. The first period ended 4-0. In the second Briden did some pretty work in getting the puck out of the danger zone after a face-off that looked very favourable to Hollinger. Soon after Gregg managed to draw Levine out of his goal and scored the 5th. At one time during this period Porcupine was only playing three men, the others taking a rest in the penalty box. Fell was defence, Gagnon, wings, and centre, and by their clever work Bingham didn't even have to exert himself in goal. By some amusing tactics they gave the Hollinger boys good exercise chasing back and forth to the far side of the rink for the puck. When the team were at strength again by some good team work between Briden and Spence another goal was obtained. In the third period Gregg and Spence were responsible for the 7th; Spence and Gregg for the 8th, and Spence and Gagnon just a few seconds after for the ninth. In these last plays Spence stole the pass from Hollinger in the centre ice and the forwards rushed in three-man combination on the goal making a counter every time. The Porcupine boys received decidedly the majority of the many penalties but all for minor offences. Some of the fans thought Burns was trying to polish off any of their rough edges, in view of the fact that they may be in line for the Allan Cup. The game was handled by W. Burns and J. Walker. Porcupine line-up—Goal, Bingham; defence, Fell and Palangio; centre, Gagnon; wings, Spence and Gregg; subs., Hughes, Briden and Hamilton. After the game the boys were entertained to dinner at the home of Mr. and Mrs. J. B. Hutchinson, Dome Mines.

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During the past week there were interesting times at the Curling rink. The semi finals for the Gallagher Cup were played between the rinks of H. Boyle and Gordon manned as follows: W. D. Pearce, S. Pearce, A. Bucevetsky, H. Boyle skip, 15 points; J. Alexander, J. Hogg, W. Brooks, L. Sauder, 2 points. It was nip and tuck as to the winner until the final end which closed giving Boyle 14 and Russell 15. The successful rink was composed of Dr. Kinsman, M. Legate, Dr. Somerville and Dr. Russell, skip. We are told it was only the third time, Dr. Kinsman, had been curling. During the game the handsome trophy filled the onlookers with a warmth of appreciation and the thoughts of it was an inspiration to the contesting rinks. The Lang Shield series is now being played.
