MUCH INTEREST AND FUN ON KIWANIS ITALIAN DAY

Kiwanis Club Also Hears Excellent Address on the Coals of Alberta. Big Attendance and Pleasant Time at Luncheon

But, yes, we have no Macaroni. We have no Macaroni to-day. We have string beans and onions, Cabbages and Scallions, And plenty Spagget! But, say! We have the old-fashioned tomato, Long Island potato, But, yes, we have no Macaroni. We have no Macaroni to-day.

The above was the song rendered at the opening of the Kiwanis luncheon at the Empire Hotel on Monday. 'Gene lead the singing, and Pete and Leo led the noise. From the Macaroni song until the very end of the event there was fun and interest and the right kind of a good time for all. It was "Italian Day," and Chairman Lap Laprairie of the committee in charge and his assistants did themselves proud in the production of this day.

The guests for the day included:—Dr. Brill, of Timmins; Mr. H. M. Roseco, Vancouver, Mr. P. M. Yancey, and Mr. R. Grubb, of Montreal, these three being connected with the Canadian General Explosives Company; and Mr. 'Gene Colombo, of South Porcupine and Timmins. 'Gene favoured the gathering with two or three songs that delighted all and were very much appreciated.

The speaker of the day was Mr. H. Roseco, of Vancouver, who gave a most interesting and illuminating address on the coals of Alberta. He emphasized the fact that in speaking on this line, care should be taken to use the plural form, as Alberta had ten to fifteen distinct varieties of coal, ranging from the bituminous coal used largely for steam-making purposes by the C.P.R. and C.N.R. to the domestic fuel coals that are most acceptable for house use. Chimney sweeps are unknown in Alberta, Mr. Roseco pointed out, because the grades of coal used for domestic and other purposes make little smoke and no soot. Alberta has 36 coal areas of importance, and its fuel industry will eventually be a very important one, and one that will be of growing interest and importance to the Dominion as it is more widely known. Mr. Roseco on Monday did a noteworthy part in making Alberta coals better known and appreciated by the very clear and interesting account he gave of them to the Kiwanis Club.

The luncheon served for the occasion was a particularly attractive one and included many delicious Italian dishes. One of these savoury dishes was a great favourite, but no one could put a name to it, so it was passed along as the "Besta dish."

URGING BUILDING MORE NEEDED ROADS IN NORTH

At Toronto last week the construction of badly-needed roads in the North was urged by a deputation from Cochrane, Hearst, Kapuskasing and other districts of northern Ontario, who waited on Premier G. H. Ferguson, Hon. Charles McCrae and Hon. Finlayson. Roads were needed if settlers were to stay on the land and farm it after the timber had been cut, it was contended. After discussion with the Ministers, the deputation appointed a subcommittee which will take up the matter with the departments concerned.

Timmins High School and the Technical Day School

Committee This Week Visiting Toronto in Connection with the Proposition. Outline of the Plan as Made in the Memorandum of the Advisory Committee of Vocational Classes of Timmins High School.

Mr. V. H. Emery, chairman of the High School Board, and Messrs D. Ostrosser, and C. R. Murdock left this week for Toronto to interview the Department of Education relative to the proposal to establish Technical day classes in connection with the Timmins High School. At a meeting of the High School Board some days ago it was decided to send this committee to Toronto to take the matter up with the Government.

Following a survey of the town of Timmins and surrounding district, the Advisory Committee of Vocational Classes of the Timmins High School Board decided to recommend the establishment of a technical school for the day pupils, providing for the following courses:—Commercial, Household Science, Mechanical (Wood-Working and Iron-Working), and Mining. These courses, it was thought, could be provided for by the building of two wings to the present High School, to be used solely for technical classes and accommodations. They would include as a general scheme six class-rooms allotted as follows:—Commercial department, three class-rooms, each with typewriting annex; Household Science, one class-room, with a sewing room (dressmaking and millinery); Mechanical department

two class-rooms, with wood-working room, metal-working room and drafting room, with one geology and mining laboratory, one ore dressing laboratory, one assaying and balance room, and one physics room.

According to this outline there would be seven class-rooms and ten auxiliary rooms, but for a few years, it was decided that a separate classroom for mining pupils need not be provided, the results of the survey suggesting that the demand hardly warranted separate room accommodation for mining study. In the survey, the prospective pupils declared themselves as follows:—Commercial, 65; Mechanical, 45; Household Science, 15; Mining, 1. Most of those signing for Mechanical courses have in view entrance into the machine shops connected with the mines, and when the content of the course in mining becomes known it is likely that the number enrolling for this study will increase. However in the meantime the Advisory Committee and the High School Board are agreed on recommending only six class-rooms and the use of the extra space for accommodation for practical work. The class-rooms should accommodate 25 pupils each.

ANOTHER GOOD BUDGET BY FINANCE MINISTER ROBB

Reductions in Income and Sales Tax. No Change Made in the Tariff. Looks Like a Popular Budget

Last week the Finance Minister, Hon. Mr. Robb, announced his budget, and like the previous one by the same Minister, this one promises to be popular. It suggests decreased taxes in many ways, and with no changes in tariff to disturb industry further. Many will feel, however, that what are known as the "nuisance taxes" should have been abolished altogether, even if this meant that no reduction should be made in the income taxes.

In brief, the following are the proposed tax reductions announced in the Budget speed:—

A reduction of 10 per cent. is made on all income tax rates.

A reduction of 20 per cent. is made on all sales tax rates.

A reduction of 25 per cent. is made on match tax.

Exemption from stamp tax on cheques, notes, etc., increased from \$5 to \$10.

Stamp tax on cheques, bills, notes, etc., of a value over \$10 is now 2 cents. The graduated scale is abolished.

Stamps tax on overdrafts and advances abolished.

Income tax change comes into effect for this spring's payments.

Sales tax reduction comes into effect tomorrow.

Stamp tax changes and match tax change come into effect on July 1.

Special War Revenue Act amended to make it clear that printers are liable to sales tax.

Tariff changes, none.

NOTICE OF BY-LAW By-law No. 15

Of the Board of Trustees of the Roman Catholic Separate Schools for the Town of Timmins.

Being a By-law to authorize the Board to borrow moneys for the purpose of meeting current expenditures.

Be it Enacted as a By-law of the Board of Trustees of the Roman Catholic Separate Schools for the Town of Timmins, as follows:

The Chairman and Secretary may as required for the purpose aforesaid borrow money, in all not exceeding the sum of \$76,000.00 from a chartered bank upon the credit of the Board and for the security and payment thereof hypothecate or pledge the Roman Catholic Separate Schools rates and for that purpose execute all necessary documents.

Passed this 3rd day of February, 1927.

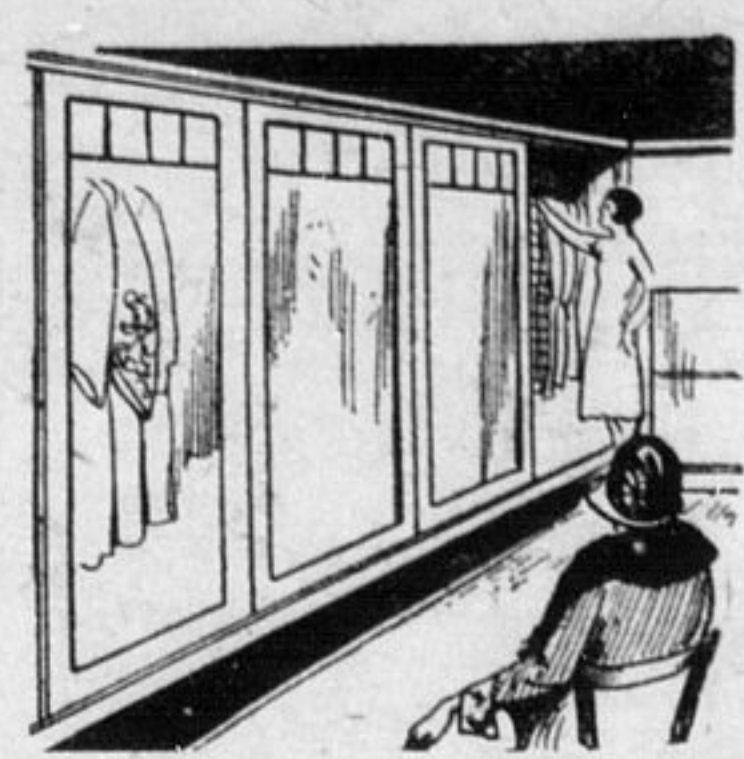
