**ASSAULT AND ROBBERY ON STREET SUNDAY NIGHT**

Police Show Speedy and Effective Action. Other Cases at This Week's Court.

There were seventeen cases at police court this week. The most important of these was an assault and robbery charge against A. J. Usitalo, who was remanded until this afternoon on the charges. Ollie Lunka, a Finlander from South Porcupine, informed the police Sunday night about midnight that he had been knocked down on Fourth avenue and robbed of \$18.00. He said he knew the man who did it, though he only knew his one name, John. He gave a good description of his assailant, and the police showed much speed and efficiency. They worked on the description and on other clues and inside of an hour had Usitalo under arrest. Lunka identified him as his assailant. Another Finlander, Matta Pajle, also charges Usitalo at this court with assault. Usitalo denies both charges.

The case of Albert Kociulek, charged with the theft of a bicycle last fall, was also remanded until this afternoon.

Six drunks were taxed \$10.00 and costs each.

A merchant charged with using a lottery machine device was fined \$10, and costs and the machine confiscated. Others in town using punch-boards should make a note of this.

A fine of \$50.00 and costs was imposed for illegally having liquor.

A theft charge and a counter charge of attempting to procure were mutually withdrawn.
