## South Porcupine Lose by One Goal in O.H.A. Game at Toronto

Porcupine Lads Put Up Fine Brand of Hockey. Held London to a Tie in the First Period, and Had a Lead of One at the end of the Second. The Londoners Edged South End out in the Last Period.

Last night in the Toronto Arena South Porcupine, Senior N.O.H.A. champions were defeated by the London Gunners, Intermediate O.H.A. champions, by a score of 4-3, after a hard fought game. About 4500 spectators witnessed the game which was a good one.

The following report of the game is made up from the despatches which came over the wire of Homer Gibson & Co.'s Timmins office. A large crowd of fans gathered at this place to hear the returns come in, and this service was much appreciated.

The teams were:— South Porcupine—Bingham, goal; Hughes and Palangio, defence; Quinn, centre; Gregg and Spence, wings; Fell, Gagnon, Levine and Breden, subs.

London—Gordon, goal; Reynolds and Pritchard, defence; Somerville, centre; Ziegler and Catam, wings; McGeoch and Filmore, subs.

Referee—Harold Farlowe, Toronto. The first period opened with the London Gunners on the offensive, but failing to get by Bingham. The Gunners came in with a three-man combination but lost at the South Porcupine defence. Four minutes from the face-off the Gunners make the first tally when Filmore went in and scored the first goal of the evening. One minute later on a pretty combination play, Gregg and Quinn went in and registered the first tally for South Porcupine. Gregg drew the first penalty of the game. Pritchard was sent to the box for tripping Gregg shortly after. Spence lost to Reynolds. The South Enders nearly scored in a mix-up in front of the London net. Pritchard again went to the box for dumping Gregg. Gregg lost a fine chance to score, when he was a trifle slow on taking the pass. The South Enders were working some fine combination but could not get through. Bingham was called on to do some spectacular work at this interval. Hughes went in alone, but shot wide. End-to-end play developed, both teams making frequent rushes. Somerville nearly scored, and Reynolds took a chance on a long one which went wide. Palangio went to the box when he tripped Reynolds. Spence and Quinn went right through the whole London team, and Gordon made a sensational save. The period ended with the score a tie. Play in the first was fairly even with the Northern champs. showing the most speed and playing a trifle better

combination, but failing to cover their goal mouth.

The second opened with Somerville again on the offensive. This period was not nearly so exciting as the first. Filmore was stopped up quick by the South Porcupine defence. The despatches describe this play thus: "stopped like he hit a brick wall." Quinn nearly scored from a mix-up in front of the Gunners goal. Pritchard went to the box for roughing Spence. The hopes of the London Artillery played a defensive game when any man was in the box. Somerville took a rest when he tripped Spence. The South Enders made a very dangerous rush, which Reynolds broke up, and called on Bingham to make a wonderful save. A lot of rushes did not get by centre ice making the play ragged. Quinn stepped into Somerville and Zeigler to save what looked like a sure goal. The ex-Timmins Junior was showing lots of speed, and got in on Gordon when Pritchard tripped him, the Gunner going to the box for a rest. Gregg joined him when he tripped Filmore. Spence called on Gordon to make a wonderful save. Two seconds before the period ended Gregg and Spence went in on a combination play and made it two for the South Porcupine team. The period ended:—South Porcupine 2. London 1. The play throughout was not so fast. The Gunners had the advantage at the start, but toward the end of the period the northerners had an advantage.

End-to-end play featured the opening of the third period. Palangio took an enforced rest when he tripped Filmore. Spence tried a lone rush, but Gordon saved. Zeigler weaved his way through the Porcupine defence and scored on a hard shot nine minutes from the start. Gunners 2. Right after, Reynolds rushed and batted the puck from the blue line, the disc slipping past Bingham. Gunners 3. The South Enders came back in a desperate offensive, but Gordon was proof against their shots. Fell checked the whole London team, but went to the box for boarding Filmore. Spence rushed, Filmore blocked, went round the defence and gave the Gunners another goal. With only four minutes to go, the Northerners again scored, their whole team being on the forward line. Quinn got the puck on a rebound from Gregg's shot. The Northerners were still on the offensive when the gong rang. London 4. South Porcupine 3.

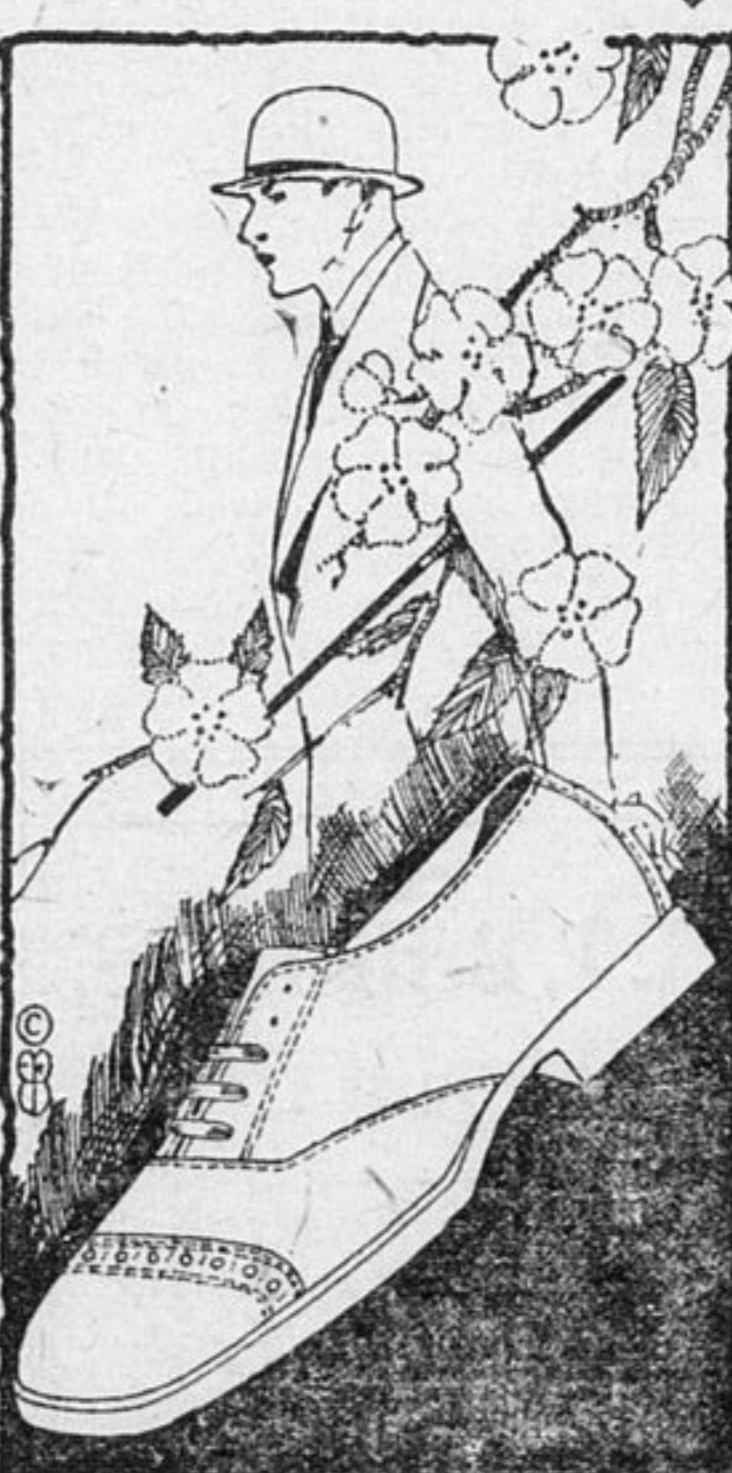
