

Blinding Speed of Eskimos Won Their First Game

Speed and more speed to such an extent that the Owen Sound Greys were only half in the picture, and could do nothing against their faster opponents, seems to foretell the result of the series between the two teams in the elimination rounds of the Memorial Cup series for the Junior Championship of the Dominion. Toronto fans have not seen what they have termed such "blinding speed" in the ranks of the Junior teams hereabouts.

Although there were many Falls outers in the rink from all over the North country, they did not even in their wildest dreams figure that the tri-colour sextette would have such a margin on their opponents. We have contended all along this winter that the superior speed and stick handling ability of Captain Lever's men carried them along throughout the winter against their opponents. These two factors, coupled with stone-wall defensive tactics, fierce back checking and superb goal-keeping were the three dominant features of the win.

Subs Good as Regulars
It must be agreed that the Owen Sound team, which appears to lack sub strength to a deplorable extent, are losing stamina due to their series recently with Newmarket. On the other hand especially from a back checking point of view both Kitson and Wimperis did not weaken the team at any stage of the game. Offensively they did not work as well as the regulars but this was due to

strict instructions from the bench to back check above all things. It was in this department as a whole that the Falls team subdued the losers. Lever, at centre, who undoubtedly was the best man on the ice on either side, was the pivot of the defence. Using a far more devastating poke check than he has shown all winter in the Falls he continually broke up the Owen Sound attacks or forced them around to the side of the rink to get around him and in such cases the defence took care of the puck carrier.

Neither Fillman nor McBride ever played as strong a defensive game as they did Thursday. They refused to be drawn out and gave Kerr wonderful protection. McBride was the star of either defence and was a huge factor in the win. He scored two goals, both on well executed plays, used his body well and was a tireless worker. We have mentioned Lever from a defensive point of view. On the offensive he was brilliant. Time after time with his poke check he broke away beyond the Greys' forward line and scored one goal on a beautiful lone effort coming from behind his own goal and skating through the entire Owen Sound team to flip the puck over Grant's body as the goalie fell trying to block the net.

Superior Condition
On the wings McIntyre and McLeod worked hard and their back checking could not be improved upon. Markle and Lauder the two Owen Sound wing men are very impressive performers and it was not until the

last period that the Falls superior condition enabled these two men to scintillate. Owing to their two previous hard games against Newmarket the Orange and Black players faded badly in the final period and were a very jaded bunch of players when they finally stepped off the ice.

In the nets Kerr was sensational and practically unbeatable. On at least two occasions the losers got inside the defence with two and three men sweeping in on the defenceless Kerr but each time he either out-guessed them or forced them to shoot wide. In this respect Owen Sound lost two chances of sure goals. Their attempts to score from long range, which they continually tried to do were easy for Kerr. Fillman who teamed with McBride on the defence did not shine as effectively as McBride from an offensive point of view but defensively he was a stone wall and never performed better this year. Summing the game up as a whole the Falls players were superior individually to their opponents and were much faster.

Greys Checked Off Feet
Lauder who is the Owen Sound captain, and McDougall, their star centre, were the two dangerous threats throughout the first two periods of the game but faded with the rest of their team mates in the last twenty minutes. McDougall was forever a back checking menace, while Lauder shone going in on the defence. The one goal Owen Sound got was due to the only mistake the Falls team made and at the time there was something less than twenty seconds of the period still to go. McLeod had been ruled off for tripping and McIntyre attempted to rag the puck behind his own goal. In coming out he slipped and fell. Lauder seized the puck and with several men standing in front of him

but failing to check, he scored a cross fire shot as he was skating away from the net towards the corner of the rink. The rest of the players on the Owen Sound team are only mediocre but fit into the team through good coaching.

The First Period
The game opened very fast with the Falls pressing and having two shots to their opponents' one. The checking was very close. McLeod and Lever got right in but the pass was called offside. The first penalty of the game came when Moore was put off for charging McBride. Closely following this McIntyre skated behind the Owen Sound net and took Paddon's feet from under him. This evened the penalties. Markle missed a pass right in front of the net and with the return rush McBride took McIntyre's rebound and shot it past Grant. The teams continued to battle fiercely up and down the ice and Lauder took a penalty for throwing McIntyre's stick into the corner. It was following this that Lever scored his brilliant end to end goal making the score Falls 2, Owen Sound 0.

Owen Sound missed several beautiful chances to score through inaccurate shooting. McLeod tripped Beatty and went off. It was then that Owen Sound got their goal as stated above. It was the only lax thing the Falls team did throughout the entire evening. The period ended Falls 2, Owen Sound 1.

Owen Sound Missed Chances
At the start of the second period Lever hurt his leg and went off. He had been consistently checking Owen Sound single handed and was given a wonderful hand by the crowd for his spectacular playing. In this respect the huge crowd that filled the Arena Gardens showed wonderful sportsmanship in applauding the outstand-

ing plays on both sides. McBride tried to body check Lauder but got his foot in the way and went off. McIntyre rushed with McLeod beside him and after having gotten by the defence and about to shoot he lost control of the puck.

At this period of the game Owen Sound got right in with combination play but Kerr miraculously saved McDougall's shot. Lever was again hurt when he accidentally got McDougall's stick in the face, cutting the cheek just under the eye which required medical attention. He had to go to the dressing room. Wimperis who replaced him missed a sure goal in front of the net when he was unable to handle a bounding pass out. Paddon rushed and shot and almost scored on his own rebound but shot into Kerr's pad. McBride rushed up the centre and drove a vicious shot from the blue line which Grant partially stopped but the puck rolled halfway in the net for the Falls third goal of the game. The puck was driven with terrific force and Grant could not keep it out. Kerr saved a sure shot off Lauder's stick. McIntyre returned the puck and after going right through lost the puck at the goal mouth and McLeod missed the rebound. Just before the period ended Kerr saved again single handed when a two man combination beat the defence. They were right in but skated too close before shooting. The second period ended Falls 3, Owen Sound 1.

Greys Were All In
At the commencement of the third period McIntyre almost scored on a solo effort. Grant just got the shot and no more. Not to be denied McIntyre again rushed and when forced to the corner passed to McLeod in front of the net and the latter scored the final goal of the game. Following

this McLeod went off for hooking McDougall and Lauder went off for bodying McBride in mid-ice. Fillman and McLeod combined, the latter getting in but he hit Grant's pads with the shot. This looked like a sure goal but wasn't. McBride went off for tripping Lauder and the game ended shortly after this. In the final moments of the game the losers were so evidently well played out that three men at times were standing back on the defence. This did not look like good business with three goals to the bad but it looked as though they were contented with the four to one score, depending on the game Saturday night to try and overcome the lead.
