**BOARD OF TRADE ELECTS DR. McINNIS PRESIDENT**

Retiring President, T. F. King, Urges More General Interest in Work of the Board

The annual meeting of the Timmins Board of Trade was held in the town hall on Tuesday evening, with President T. F. King presiding. In the absence of the secretary, Mr. W. O. Langdon, the president appointed G. A. Macdonald as secretary for the meet-

ing. The attendance was small, and during the evening there were several regretful references to the apparent lack of interest thus shown by the failure of so many to attend this meeting of the Board of Trade.

In his address to the meeting, the president referred to the fact that he had called several meetings of the whole membership of the Board of Trade early in the year just closing, but attendance at these meetings had been poor. The executive, however, had responded to all calls made upon them, and all business arising had consequently been well attended to. During the year the Board of Trade had been able to do much for the town of Timmins, and still more would be accomplished if there were more interest shown by the public in general. President King thanked the officers, the executive and the public generally for the co-operation and support given when called upon. In view of the fact that he had been president of the Board of Trade for several terms during the past ten years or so, he thought it would be best to have a change and see if with a new president more interest could not be stirred up. He was nominated for another term, but declined to stand. It was then moved by G. A. Macdonald, seconded by W. H. Severt, that Dr. J. A. McInnis be the president for 1927, the new president being elected by acclamation. Mr. W. O. Langdon was re-elected secretary-treasurer by acclamation, the motion being moved by Mr. S. David and seconded by Mr. J. R. Walker.

The new president is to follow the precedent set in recent years and select the members of the executive.

Mr. A. Kee offered the suggestion that a publicity committee be formed by the Board of Trade to make the Porcupine better known to the rest of the world, to correct false reports about the district, and to gather and disseminate judiciously information in regard to the town and district.

On motion of Dr. J. A. McInnis, seconded by Mr. J. R. Walker, a very hearty vote of appreciation was tendered to the retiring president, Mr. T. F. King for his public spirited efforts for the town and district, and also to the members of the 1926 executive for their work for the town.

In reply, Mr. King expressed his thanks for the motion, and also for the good work done by the executive and officers, and for the generous support of others and the public generally when called upon. He thought that with the new officers more interest might be roused and the town benefit by the increased interest.

On motion of Messrs. C. Desaulniers and Geo. A. D. Murray, the meeting adjourned to the call of the president.

**'IRISH NIGHT' ATTRACTS VERY LARGE AUDIENCE**

Another Successful and Pleasing 'National Night' in Connection With the Band Concerts.

The Goldfields theatre was filled to capacity on Sunday evening, after the church services, for the 'Irish Night' concert—another in the popular series of 'National and County' nights in connection with the band concerts.

Rev. Fr. O'Gorman occupied the chair for the evening in the most acceptable way. His opening address on Irish music was of special interest and proved pleasing and informative to all. Rev. Fr. O'Gorman showed the large part in the musical world taken by Irish people and Irish music. The Irish were the real inventors of rhyme which has so material a connection with music. The harp is of Irish origin, and as it is one of the oldest forms of instrumental music its influence is worthy of note. Rev. Fr. O'Gorman made passing reference to Moore's melodies and their influence on popular music.

The Timmins Citizens' Band, under Bandmaster F. J. Walno, was in very fine form Sunday evening and delighted all with the excellent music provided. The selections by the Band included:—march, 'The Jolly Troopers'; selection, 'Debutante'; selection, 'The Talisman'; waltz, Irish Air; all presented very effectively and with pleasing success.

An instrumental trio, by Bandsmen H. Perreault and P. Cherry and Miss Perreault, provided music of unusually sweet type and particularly fitted for the Irish numbers given. 'Killarney' by this trio won very deserved encore, and the responding number was equally appreciated.

Mr. Pat Larmer made a decided hit with a vocal solo, 'The Dear Little Shamrock,' and the audience was so pleased with this singer that a recall was insisted upon. The second number was a lively selection, given with exceptional skill and in good voice, and its Irish appeal won all lovers of music and Ireland.

Another vocalist to score a very decided hit was Mr. Thompson, whose Irish songs won unstinted applause. He gave very sympathetic and thoughtful interpretation of a popular Irish song and was heartily encored. As a recall number he gave in very clever fashion an old favourite humorous hit that made unusual appeal to the crowd.

The monologues by Mr. A. J. Downie were very general favourites. Mr. Downie has a decided gift as a monologue artist and the audience fully appreciated his numbers.

At the conclusion of the programme, Rev. Fr. O'Gorman briefly but very aptly thanked the band for the very excellent programme provided and the artists of the evening for

their talented assistance. Timmins, he said, was fortunate in being allowed the opportunity to enjoy such pleasant and high-class musical evenings. To those who liked Irish music and other good things Irish, Rev. Fr. O'Gorman pointed out that 'Peg O' My Heart' would be presented in the same theatre on March 16th and 17th.

The next band concert will be held in the Goldfields theatre on Sunday evening, March 27th, after the church services.

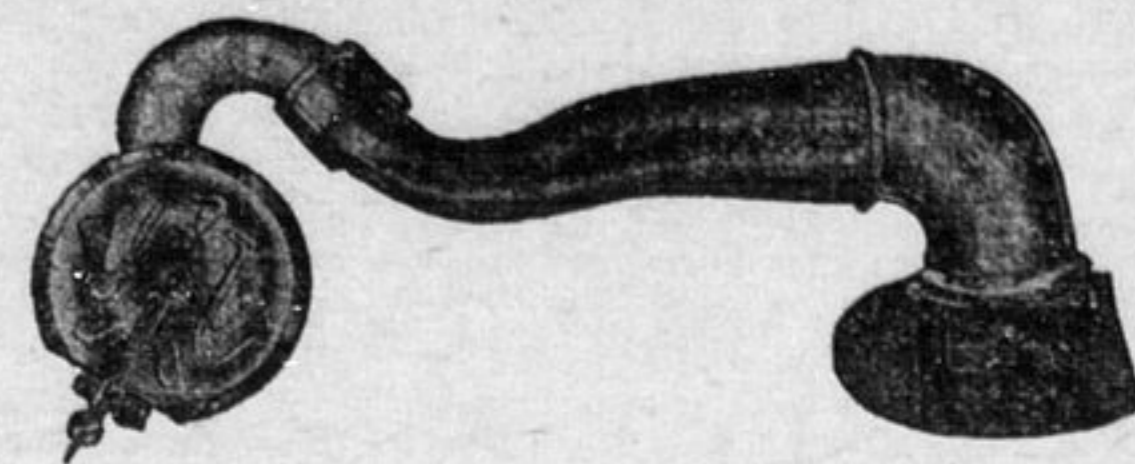

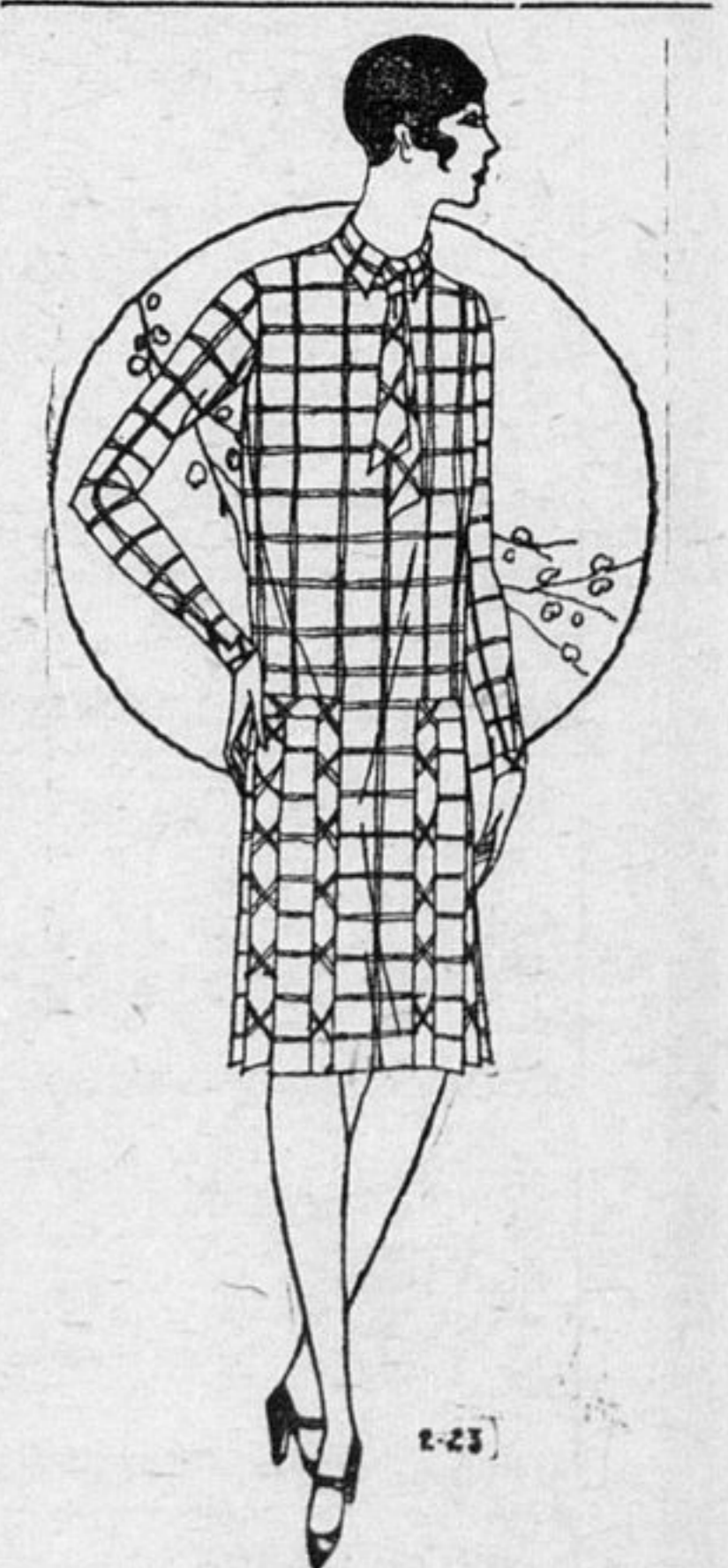
In the matter of the Estate of Jimima McGrath, late of the Town of Timmins, in the District of Cochrane, deceased.
