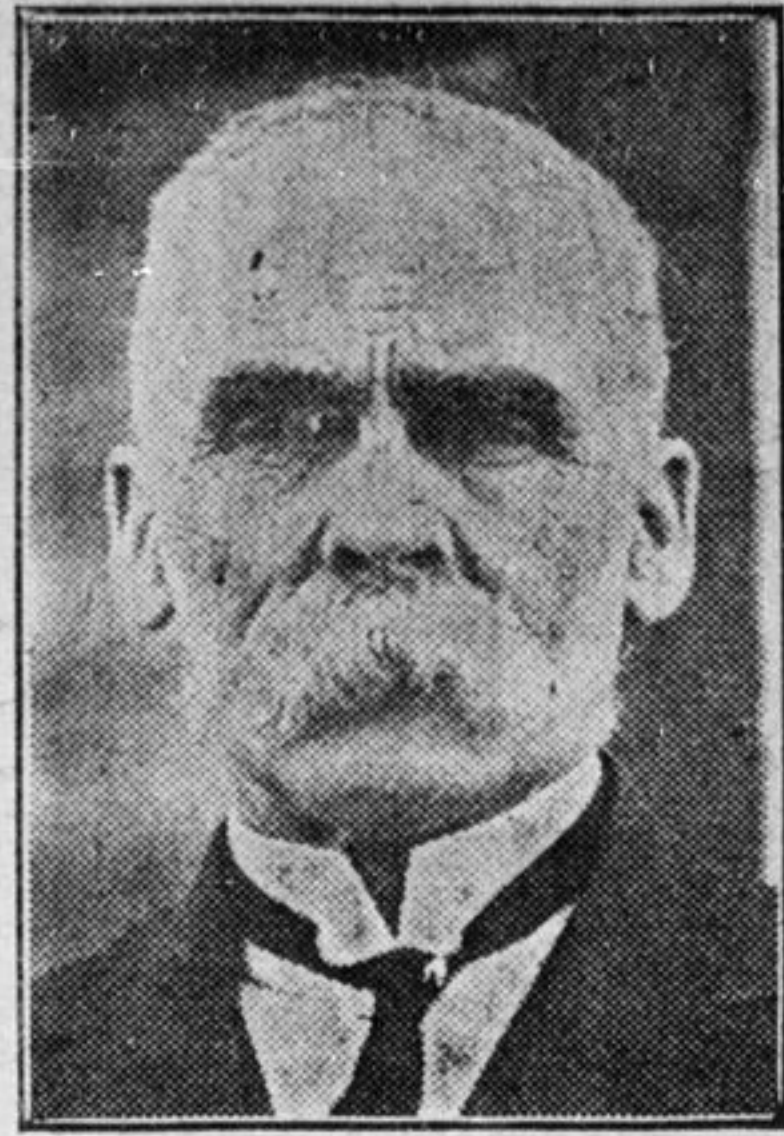

## C.V. Gallagher Again Elected Reeve of Tisdale Township

Had Majority of 337 Over S. Kennedy. Messrs Kerr,  
Hawkins and Williams, of Schumacher, and Laforest, of  
South Porcupine, Elected as Councillors Monday. Not  
a Large Vote Polled.

South Porcupine, March 23rd, 1927.

The result of the Tisdale elections  
on Monday gave Mr. C. V. Gallagher  
the reeveship by a majority of 337,  
and elected the following councillors:  
D. Kerr, Schumacher, 284 votes; J. A.  
Hawkins, Schumacher, 274; Mr. F.  
Laforest, South Porcupine, 218; Mr.  
J. E. Williams, Schumacher, 215.

Those defeated ranked as follows:  
S. Kennedy, (for reeve) 154. For  
council—G. McIntosh, 158; G. Hel-  
mer, 156; J. G. Barron, 144; J. G.  
Harris, 107; N. McKinnon, 106; Po-  
ley, 79; J. Robertson, 67; J. J. St.  
Paul, 54; H. M. Martin, 53.

There was not nearly so heavy a  
vote polled as in the December elec-  
tion.

On Monday night after the show,  
reeve-elect Gallagher and his coun-  
cillors, were called to the platform by  
'Gene Colombo to speak to the people.  
They thanked their supporters, those  
who had past experience, viz. Gallag-  
her, Kerr and Laforest, telling their  
efforts in the past and all telling of  
their hopes for the coming nine  
months. Mr. Gallagher spoke at  
length again re the auditing of the  
books of the township, stating he  
would like to see it done if it could be  
so arranged that if the audit were  
found incorrect, the present auditors  
would refund to the treasury what-  
ever reimbursement they had received  
for auditing same. But that if the  
present audit were found to be cor-  
rect that only those who were peti-  
tioning for a second audit would be  
financially responsible by taxation or  
otherwise for the added expense.

They spoke of the great capital ex-  
penditure that had been necessary in  
the past few years to give Tisdale that  
for which her residents were clamour-  
ing, viz. better school accommodation,  
waterworks, roads, etc. Now we had  
conveniences, etc., the time had come  
to retrench. Some of the councillors  
also signified their wish for an audit  
could it be done in a way to financial-  
ly protect those who were not grumbl-  
ing about the present Government  
audit. Mr. Kerr explained why it  
would not have been possible to take  
over the Light and Power as a public  
utility under existing circumstances,  
hence the necessity of the franchise  
which the people voted for.

At the close, as they were about to  
sing "God Save the King," a bomb  
was thrown into the meeting when S.  
Kennedy, defeated candidate for the  
reeveship, asked permission to speak.  
He was readily given it and proceed-  
ed to criticize the work done under  
the past regime of C. V. Gallagher,  
both as regards the waterworks sys-  
tem and the road from Timmins to  
South Porcupine. 'Gene Colombo  
from the audience asked him to state  
definitely what contractors he refer-  
red to when he stated the installation  
was not properly done. This he did  
not do, stating that it was the work  
in town. The audience was called  
upon to choose a chairman, and Mr.  
E. J. Rapsey took the chair, calling  
upon C. V. Gallagher to answer the

accusations made. This Mr. Gallag-  
her did, explaining that if they had  
not offered to pay 10% of the cost of  
the trunk road here, they would not  
yet have it. Timmins had offered 5%  
for its extension to the Mattagami  
but did not get it till the municipality  
agreed to the 10% asked by the Pro-  
vincial Government.

Mr. Kennedy still persisted that it  
was a precedent that should not have  
been set.  
As to the waterworks, money had  
been held back until the contractors  
righted any faulty part of their in-  
stallation.  
Mr. Kerr was asked to answer the  
accusation that he had come in on  
nomination day and brought a clique  
with him to run the affairs of the town-  
ship.  
After the meeting finally adjourned  
about 11 p.m., the reeve and coun-  
cillors-elect retired to the council cham-  
bers, and were sworn in, and held a  
meeting to see after some township  
business that was suffering from the  
enforced delay of affairs through  
having no regular council. Now we  
hope Tisdale is well away to a busi-  
ness-like conduct of her affairs.

### PROPOSAL ROUSES PROTESTS

Commissioner Frank Oliver's prop-  
osal, before the Board of Railway  
Commissioners, that some means be  
devised whereby a steady movement  
of wheat from the Prairies to the Atlan-  
tic seaboard during the winter months  
would be possible, drew a storm of  
protest from the railway officials.

Chas. H. Jones; and the membership  
list comprises a few athletes who have  
good records in their various perfor-  
mances.

Timmins on the map in the line of
