## "GRAVEL AND SAND"—AND PLACER

The judges who are giving short terms and whippings instead of longer terms in the penitentiary for crimes of violence very evidently believe the old saying that "the lash is mightier than the pen."

Lou Marsh runs a column on The Toronto Star's sporting page headed "Pick and Shovel." What connection would a pick have with such stuff?

Mr. and Mrs. Jean Pelletier, of Montreal, Que., last week were on their way to Rosetown, Saskatchewan, where Jean had a good position and the couple expected to establish a new home. While waiting at Cochrane Mrs. Pelletier opened one of her suitcases to take some article out, and in doing so she innocently showed that there were three bottles of Quebec beer in the suitcase. A Provincial officer standing near noticed the beer and at once took the suitcases and the husband in charge, despite the protests of other passengers who pointed out that the couple could scarcely be expected to realize how many crimes there were for the innocent and inoffensive in this puritan province of Ontario. The man was tried on the charge of illegally having liquor, and fined \$50.00 and costs. The trial took place in the station, and not having the money for the fine, the man was hustled off to jail in Cochrane, the wife being left practically stranded in a strange town. The people of Cochrane however, showed themselves much better than the law. The fine was collected by subscriptions and the couple re-united and sent rejoicing to the West. They will have very kindly feelings about the people of Cochrane, but what must they think of the law of Ontario? Imagine provincial police engaged in the finding of beer in the suitcases of innocent travellers passing through Cochrane, of all places, while at the same time the murderer of Inspector Constable still walks free and unmolested! Until the provincial police capture the murderer of Inspector Constable very shame should keep them from interfering with innocent travellers simply passing through this apparently unfortunate province where murder is unpunished but the sleuths have a wonderful scent for beer.

The Advance can not understand why some newspapers pretend to be astonished that anyone so humble as a chimney sweep should turn out to be an author, as is said to be the fact in a London, England, case. Certainly there have been lots of scavengers among the writers.

Under the high-sounding title of the North American Relations Foundation, a group of Canadians, including Mr. Justice Riddell, Sir Henry Pellatt, Prof. Geo. M. Wrong and Chancellor Wilfrid, have organized to promote good feeling between the United States and Canada and between other parts of the British Empire and the U.S.A. The necessity for such an organization is not very apparent and there is naturally a fear that any propaganda carried on is practically sure to drift towards methods that mean the further Americanization of Canada. In any event, it would appear that Canadians would be much more usefully and patriotically employed if they organized to promote better feeling between the different parts of Canada.

The chairman of Ontario's new liquor control commission is to receive \$20,000 per year. The salary of the superintendent for Ontario for neglected and dependent children is about one-fifth of that amount. Oh, well! men may get along without children, but a fellow has to have a drink!

A staff writer in The Toronto Star this week refers to The Advance as "The Weekly Bladder." This is the type of vulgarity typical of The Star, made the more objectionable by reason of its utter lack of originality. It is most reprehensible. The Intestines should never cast reflections at the Bladder.

The town council will receive the hearty approval of all good citizens for voting down on Monday the proposal that is virtually a plan to deprive the people of the athletic grounds here. No serious hardship is occasioned to anyone by the fact that Cedar street is not opened up through the ball grounds property. For years it has been known to all that this part of the street was closed. At the time the fence was being erected around the athletic grounds a by-law was introduced for the closing of this part of the street. The agitation for the opening of this portion of Cedar street seems to be selfish and unreasonable. The general public need an athletic grounds, and so many people are benefitted by the present park that it would appear to be the duty of all good citizens to do whatever is possible to retain the athletic grounds until another site is available and ready. The interests of the many, as the mayor suggested on Monday, should be given preference to the possible profit of a few.

"C.L." who writes a very interesting column for the Ottawa Journal, has a genius for making statistics appealing, and for quoting odd facts and figures. This week he points out that there are only 9,000 mules in Canada. The information would be still more interesting if he specified the distribution of these animals by towns and cities. There were quite a few in Ottawa when the Georgian Bay Canal scheme was under fire in parliament.

Timmins has now good prospects of having a new post office in the near future. Of course, the building will not be erected this year, but it is admitted by the Government that such a building is surely needed here. The Advance understands that although the amount necessary has not been actually passed on the estimates this will be done before the session ends. This will mean that the building will be provided for financially and that next year actual work of construction will likely be undertaken. For years past the need for a new post office in Timmins has been very evident, and Mr. Jos. Bradette, M.P., is to be commended for his efforts to convince the Government of the need here.

## SPECIAL SERVICES AT CHURCH OF NATIVITY

Bishop Rheame Here for Opening Sunday. Mission Being Conducted by Rev. F. Knox and Rev. Fr. Lally.

The Church of the Nativity, the new R.C. church here, opened for regular services on Sunday. His Lordship Bishop Rheame, of Haileybury, was present for the occasion and blessed the new church. He congratulated the people on the splendid new church and on the earnest and able priest in charge, Rev. Fr. O'Gorman.

The formal blessing of the church by the ritual will take place the latter part of June or in July. A mission is being conducted here at the Church of the Nativity by Rev. Fr. Knox and Rev. Fr. Lally. This week the mission is for women only, and next week it will be especially for men. Various services are held each day. There are special services held each afternoon after four for the children. All the services are being largely attended and are creating great interest.
