It is still hoped to have the whole highway completed this year, though there is not altogether a complete assurance that the roadway will be ready, as hoped by many, for the celebration of Canada's 60th birthday on July 1st.

FIRE IN NEW CHURCH FROM SPONTANEOUS COMBUSTION

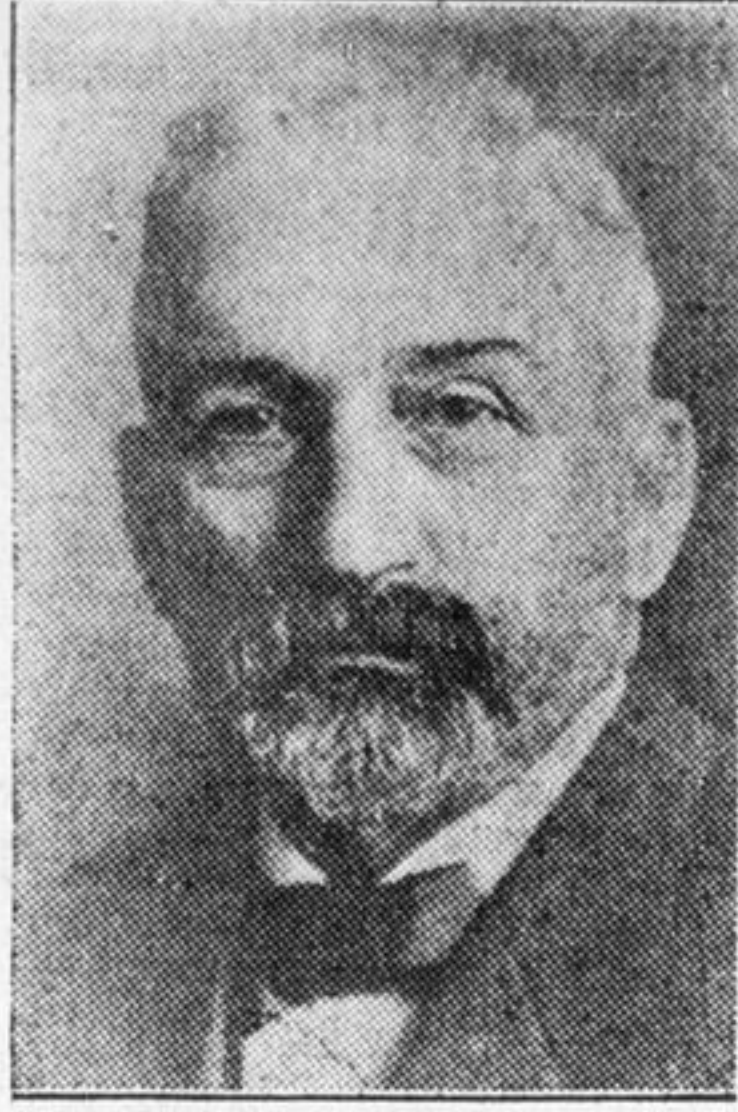
Oily Waste Left Near Radiator Causes Blaze. Caught Before Rightly Got Going.

On Sunday morning between six and half-past, the firemen had a call to the new church, the Church of the Nativity, on Spruce street. The church was being finished in readiness for the services to be regularly held there on Sunday. In the hurry of the finishing work someone left an oily rag near one of the radiators after the oiling of the floor. The oil-soaked cloth took fire and soon was burning a hole in the flooring. Fortunately the caretaker, Mr. P. Gauthier, noticed smoke and promptly turned in an alarm, at the same time tackling the fire himself with pails of water. The brigade soon reached the scene and the fire was speedily extinguished with all danger removed. The damage done was very small, probably around \$25.00. A small hole was burned in the floor, but apart from this no injury was done to the fine new building. However, if the fire had not been noticed when it was, or if it had not been so promptly handled, a more serious blaze would no doubt have resulted.

CHILDREN'S AID WORK NOT ORDINARY BUSINESS.

Writing from Toronto last week, Mr. J. J. Kelso, Superintendent of Neglected and Dependent Children in Ontario, says:—

"In commercial enterprises one naturally looks for system and economical administration, and to a certain extent this should be applied to philanthropic societies, but with this limitation: We are dealing with human hearts and lives—many of them crushed and bruised and broken—and it is only the loving touch of another heart sympathizing with their sorrows and errors that can effectively reach and win them. We may feed the body and improve the environment while still leaving the soul hungry and unsatisfied and then, too, we may lose the opportunity to inspire and quicken the individual to a new and better life. The work of the Children's Aid Society is something more than ordinary business."

CANADA FOURTH BIGGEST TEA-DRINKING COUNTRY

Each Canadian drinks over four pounds of tea per year, or practically five times as much as our American cousins to the south of us. Great Britain, (including Northern Ireland) leads the world in point of consumption by using yearly over 400 million pounds, (nearly 8½ pounds per capita). Then comes United States with 100 million, but only 9-10ths of a pound per capita. Next comes Australia with 49 million and Canada with 36 million. No reliable statistics are available for China or Russia. Both these countries consume a large amount of tea, but the per capita figure is very small.

A great deal more tea would be used on this continent if the public were educated to demand fresh tea. Old tea is flat and unpalatable. Tea is a very delicate vegetable growth, which deteriorates unless kept sealed. A bottle of ginger ale soon loses its flavour if exposed to the air. This is exactly what occurs in the case of the tea.

ALL TEAMS REPRESENTED AT MEETING OF P.D.F.L.

Rules of League Revised After Discussion. Heavy Vote Against Suggestion of Sunday Football

A general meeting of the Porcupine District Football Club was held on Saturday evening in the council chamber. The meeting was one of special interest to football lovers in the camp. President Duxfield was in the chair, and the following teams, comprising all that will make up the league this year, were fully represented,—Dome, McIntyre, Cornish One-and-All, Lancastrians, Thistles, Hollinger Recreation and Hollinger Mine. Secretary W. A. Field read the minutes of the previous meeting, which were adopted. The main business before the meeting was the revision of the local rules. On this there was full and free discussion. The revised rules that are of special interest to the supporters of the game are those referring to the referee's fees, the protest fee, and the formation of the Emergency Committee.

The referee's fee has been raised to \$2.50 per game.

The protest fee was increased to \$5.00. This was favoured because it would tend to discourage unnecessary or groundless protests being handed in as it is said had occurred in some past years. It was felt that before a team would protest with the higher fee in force greater care would be taken relative to the grounds of the protest.

Several minor changes were made in several other rules. One of the important new regulations is the one calling for an Emergency Committee to deal with any trouble that may arise relative to the supporters, the players or the officials. It was felt that for the benefit of the game all round, that stringent measures should be enforced. The outcome of the discussion was the adding of a clause providing for the forming of the Emergency Committee.

All teams were asked to name three men each, one to act as referee and two as linesmen. A series of lectures will be given on the work of referees, and before the season opens it is anticipated that several first-class men will be available to take the whistle.

The matter of Sunday football was mentioned, but the idea was voted down by a large majority.

It was decided that the first game for the season will take place between the pick of the league and last year's winners, the Holly Rees, the proceeds to go to the Children's Aid Society. The next meeting of the P.D.F.L. will be held in the town hall, Tim-
