Schumacher Mourns Death of Mrs E. McCrae Last Week

Funeral Largely Attended and Many Beautiful Floral Tributes. Other Personal and Social Items of News from Schumacher Correspondent.

Schumacher, Ont., March 30th. Special to The Advance. A feeling of general regret passed over our town last week when it was learned that the death of Mrs. E. McCrae had occurred at the hospital in South Porcupine, after a brief illness from pneumonia. The deceased lady was in the prime of life was highly esteemed and during her two year's residence in Schumacher, had won the respect and admiration of all by her industrious habits, and devotion to her two small boys, bereft so suddenly by the untimely loss of life's greatest earthly friend. The funeral was held from the late residence, Third avenue, on Friday afternoon, and was very largely attended by friends and relatives. Beautiful floral tributes bore eloquent testimony of love, sympathy and esteem. The services at the home and at the grave were conducted by Rev. Ivan Kennedy, pastor of Trinity United Church, Schumacher. The remains were interred in the cemetery at Timmins. Besides the grief-stricken mother, Mrs. Watson, and the two little sons, the surviving members of the family are two sisters, Mrs. D. Briden, Mrs. S. MacMillan, of Schumacher; two brothers, Messrs. M. and A. Black, at present employed at the Argonaut Mine, and one sister in Scotland. Mr. McCrae, the husband and father, died in Scotland about six years ago. The heartfelt sympathy of the community is extended to the bereaved ones in the hour of affliction.
