"Even the afternoon session, although opening at 1.30 and closing at 6 p.m., proved far too short for the full discussion of the numerous subjects on the convention programme. "After the 6.30 dinner at the Grand Union Hotel, a general session was held attended by the complete staffs of the New Liskeard and Cobalt branches and the representatives from Timmins and Cochrane branches. The greatest interest was displayed by all present in the theme presented by Mr. H. G. Laidlaw on the subject of the "Growing Trade Volume" of the Taylor Hardware in Mining and Milling machinery and supplies. Mr. W. "There are rumours of other companies coming into the field. 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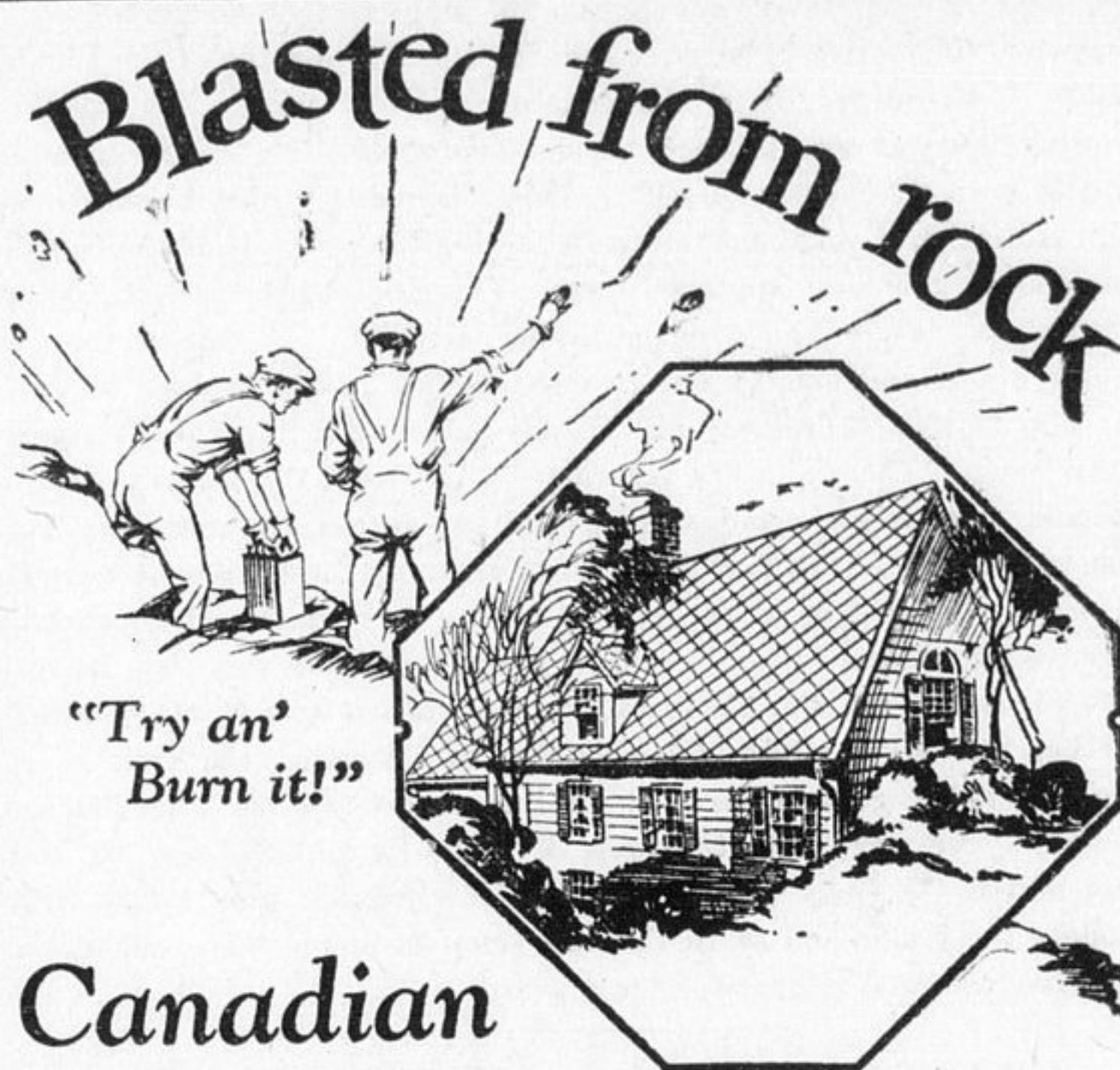
Director F. C. Elford of the World's Poultry Congress appeared before the agricultural committee of the Canadian House of Commons last week and addressing that body stated the poultry world is following the development of the poultry industry in Canada closely, and that at the coming Congress, Canadian exhibits would predominate. Canada holds all records for egg-laying, Mr. Elford said, and while phenomenal production may not be desirable on the whole its value as an advertisement for the Dominion has been great. Mr. Elford told the parliamentarians that at least thirty countries would be represented at the Congress, and possibly forty. He stressed the need for a large attendance of Canadian delegates if the representatives of overseas countries were to go home with a lasting impression of Canada and Canadians.

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
